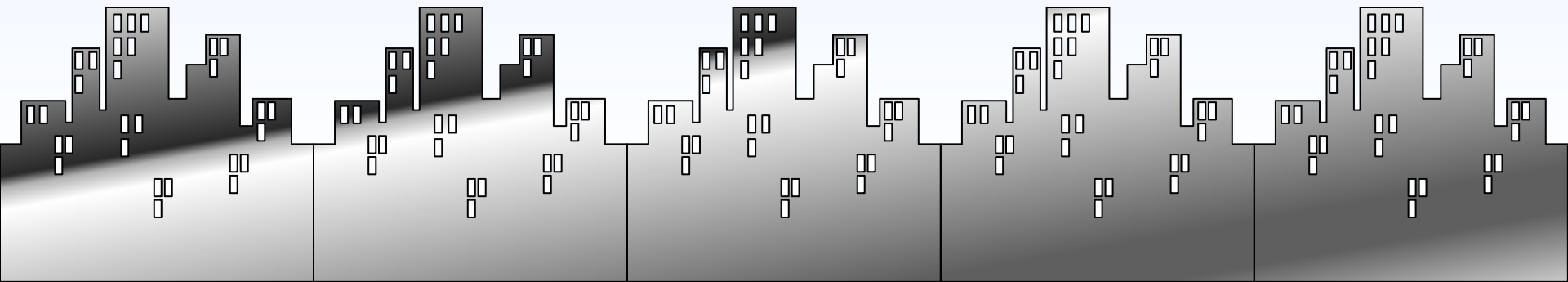

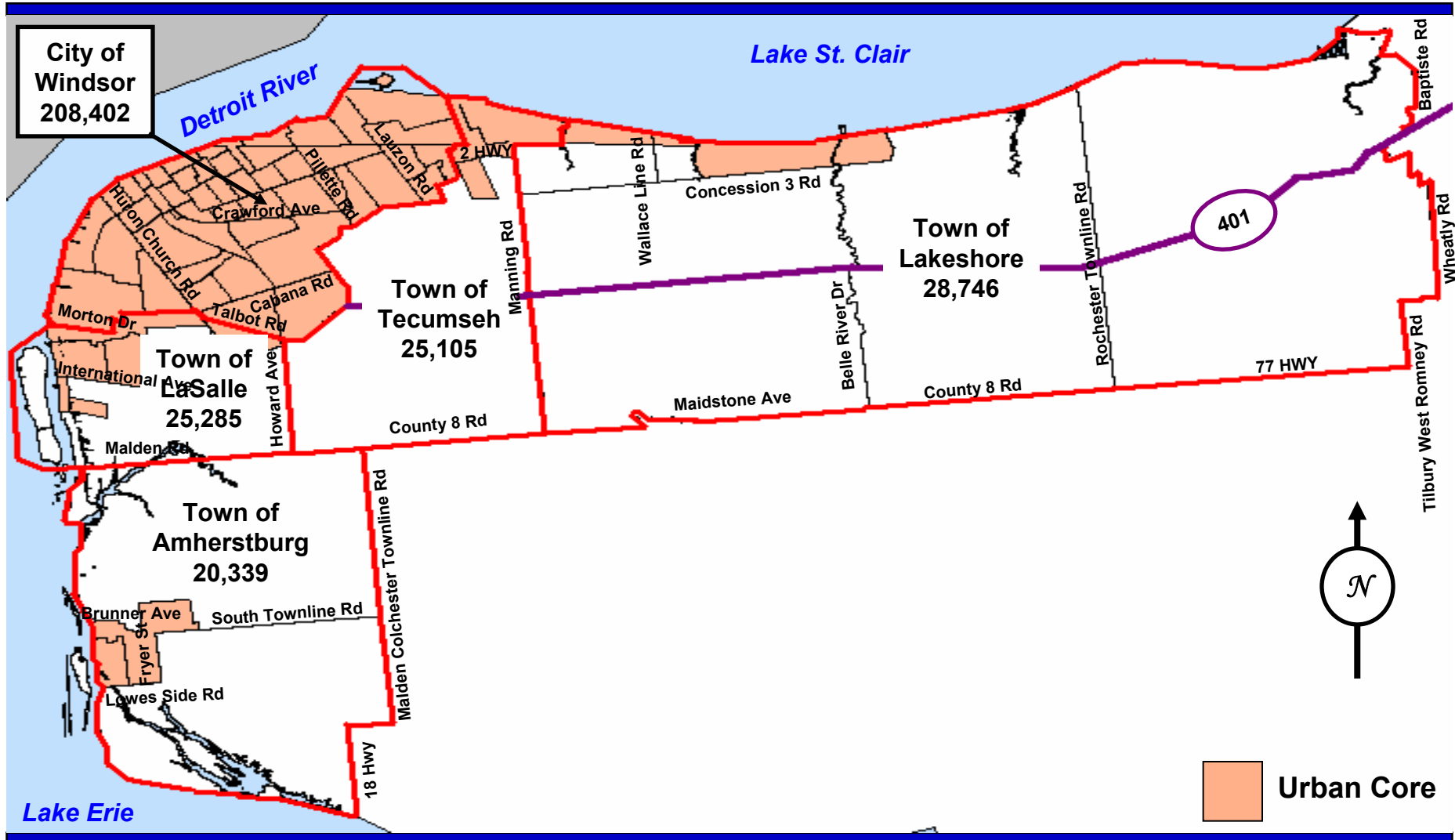




# Windsor Census Metropolitan Area, 2001

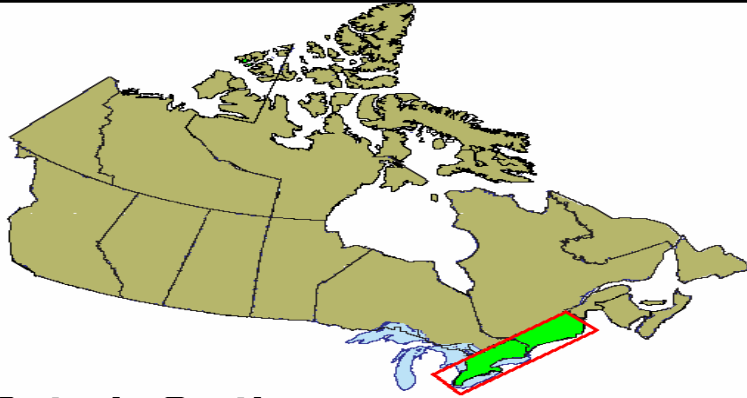

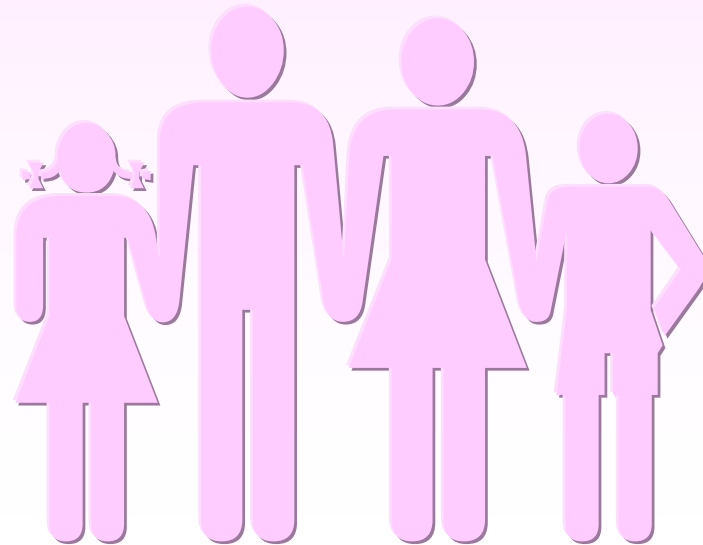

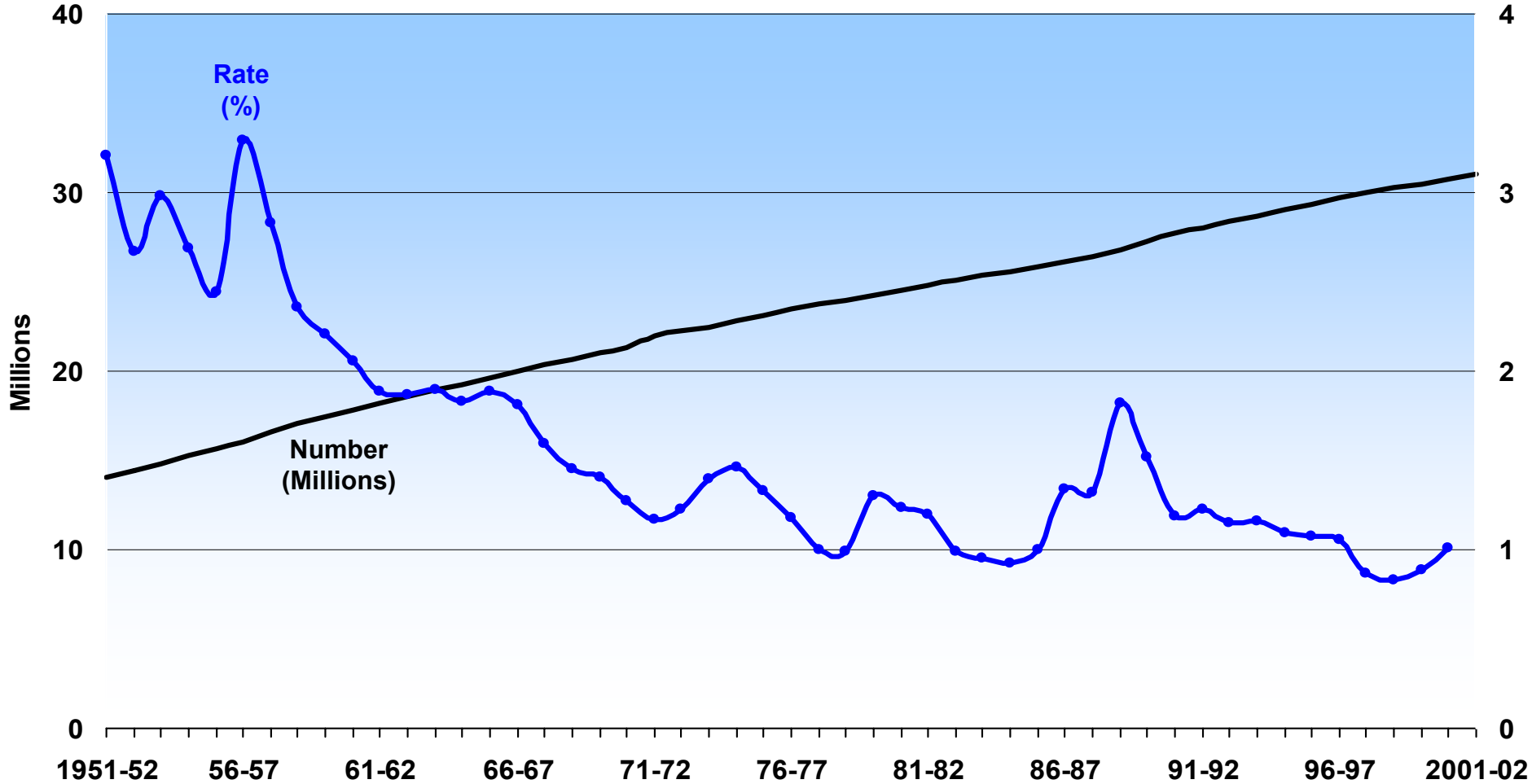

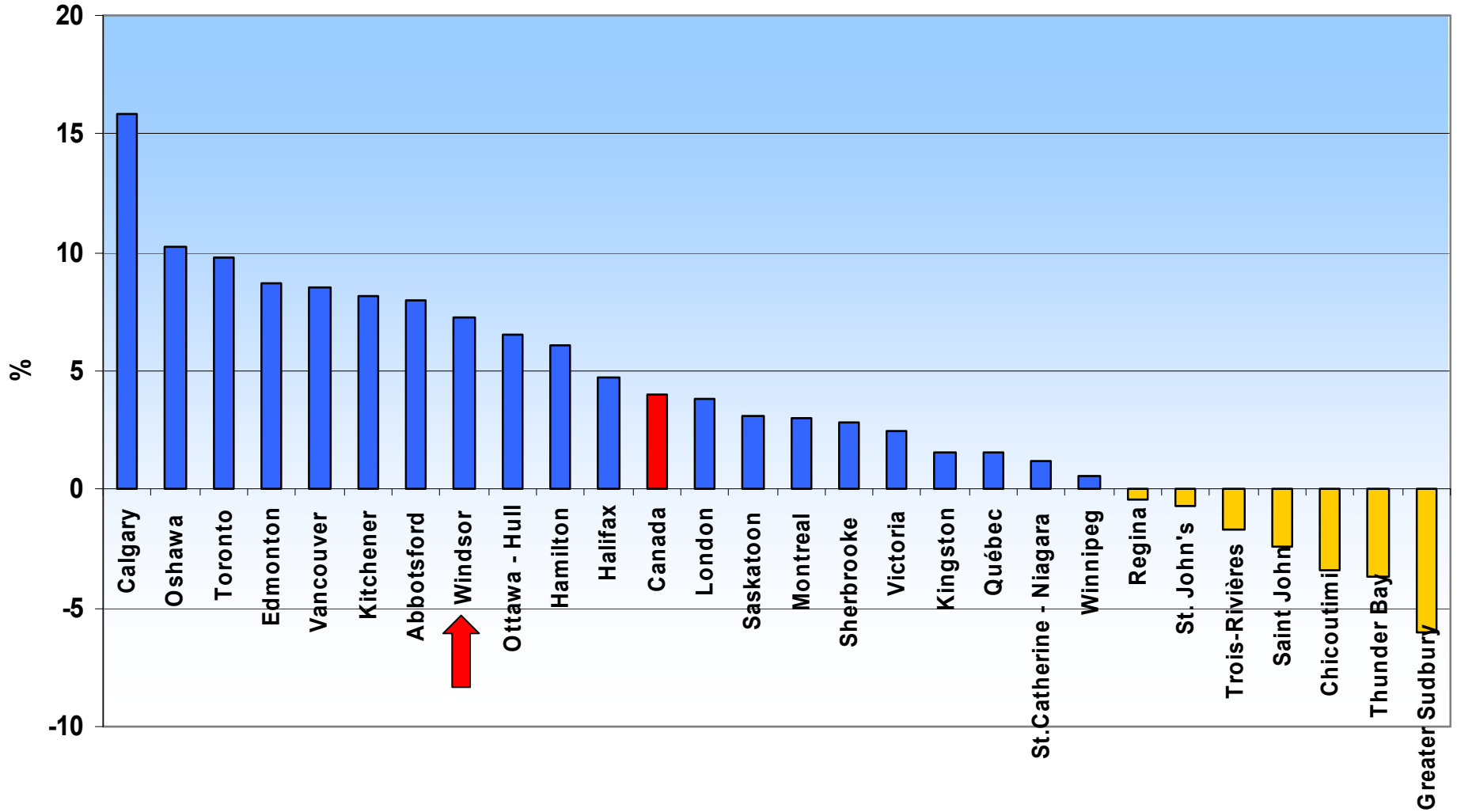
# Between 1996 and 2001, Canada experienced one of the smallest census-to-census growth rates

## Population and Population Growth Rate, Canada, 1951/52 to 2001/02



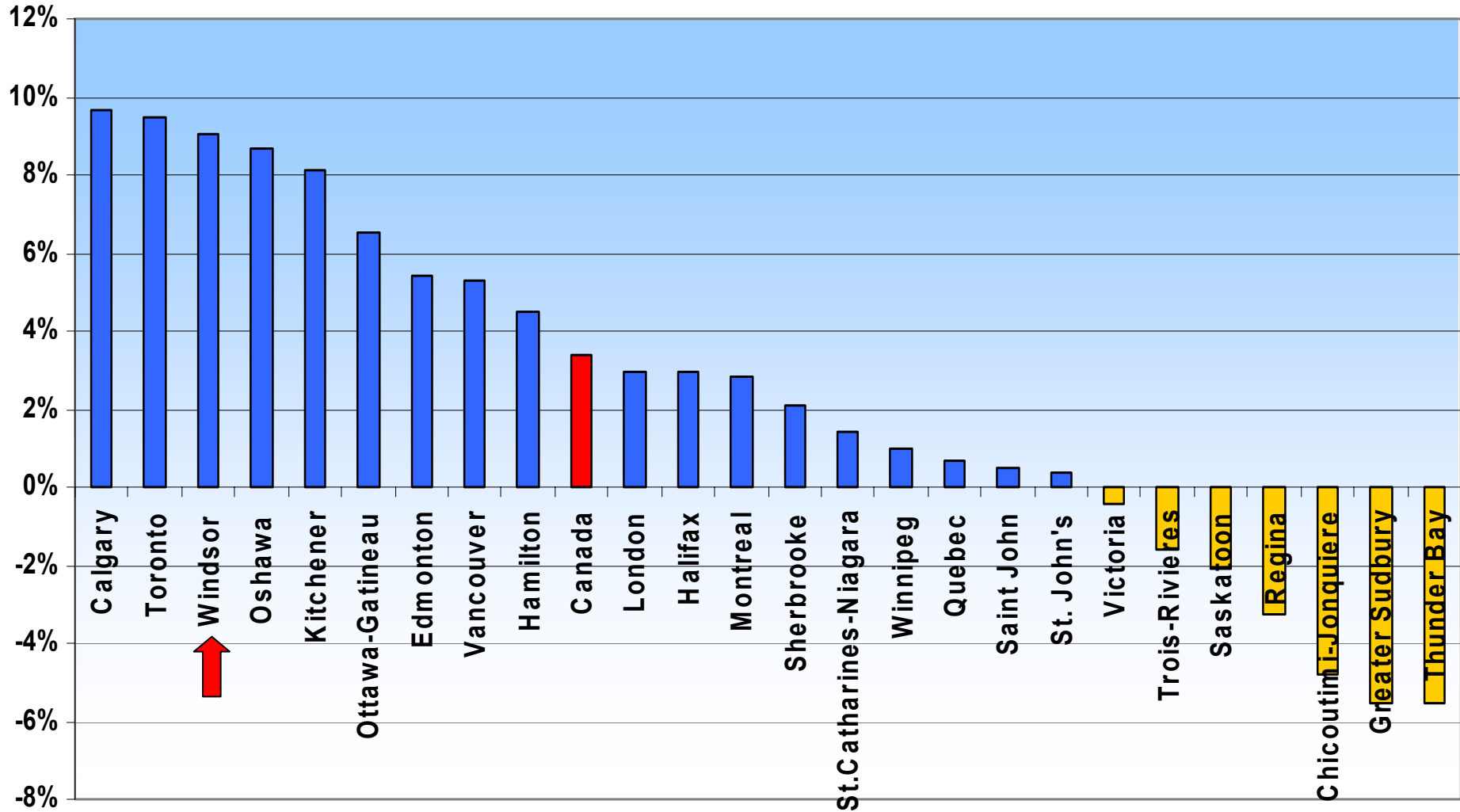


# Census Metropolitan Areas Growth and Decline, 1996 to 2001



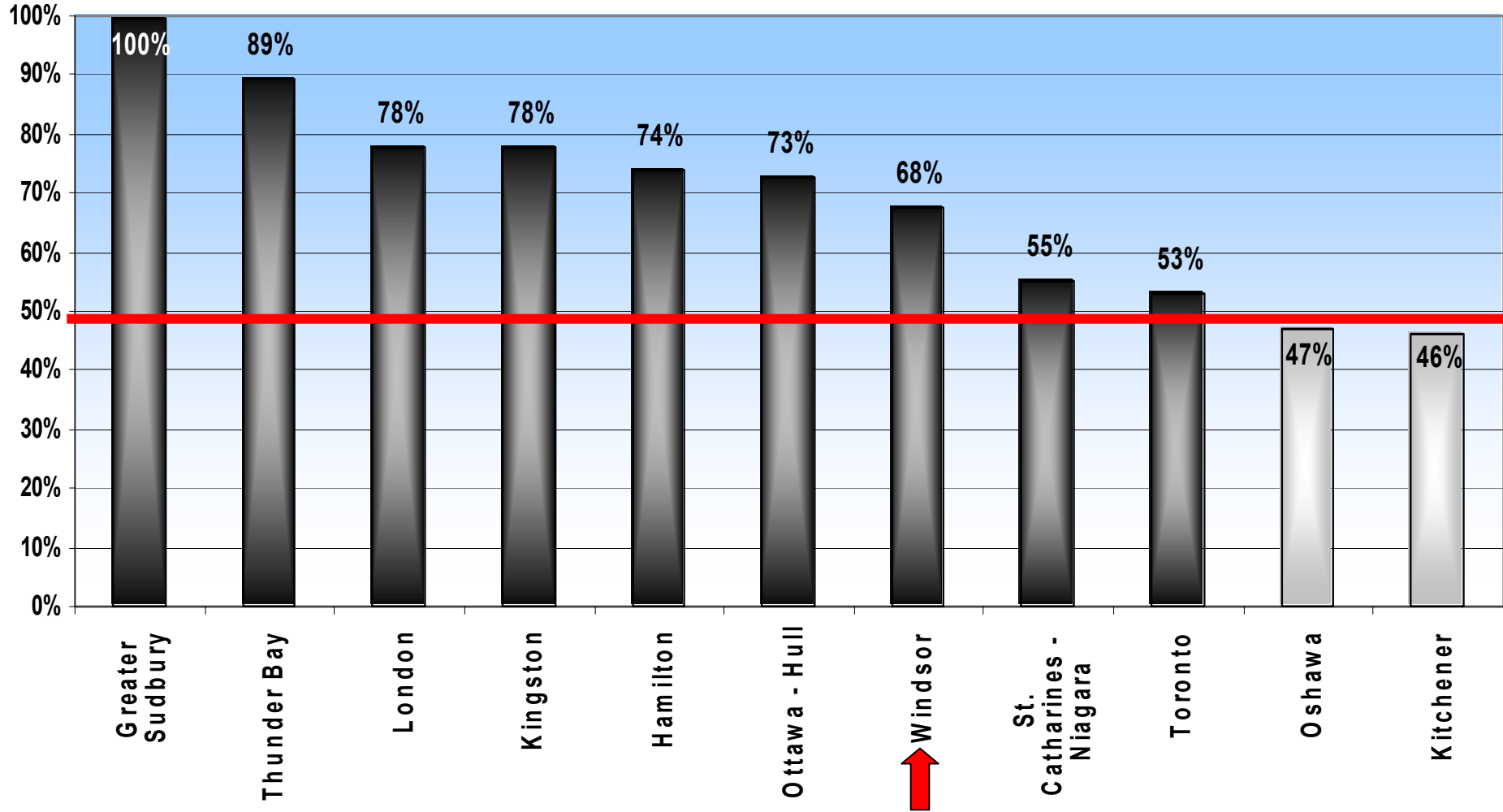


# Projected Population Changes for Census Metropolitan Areas, 2001 to 2006



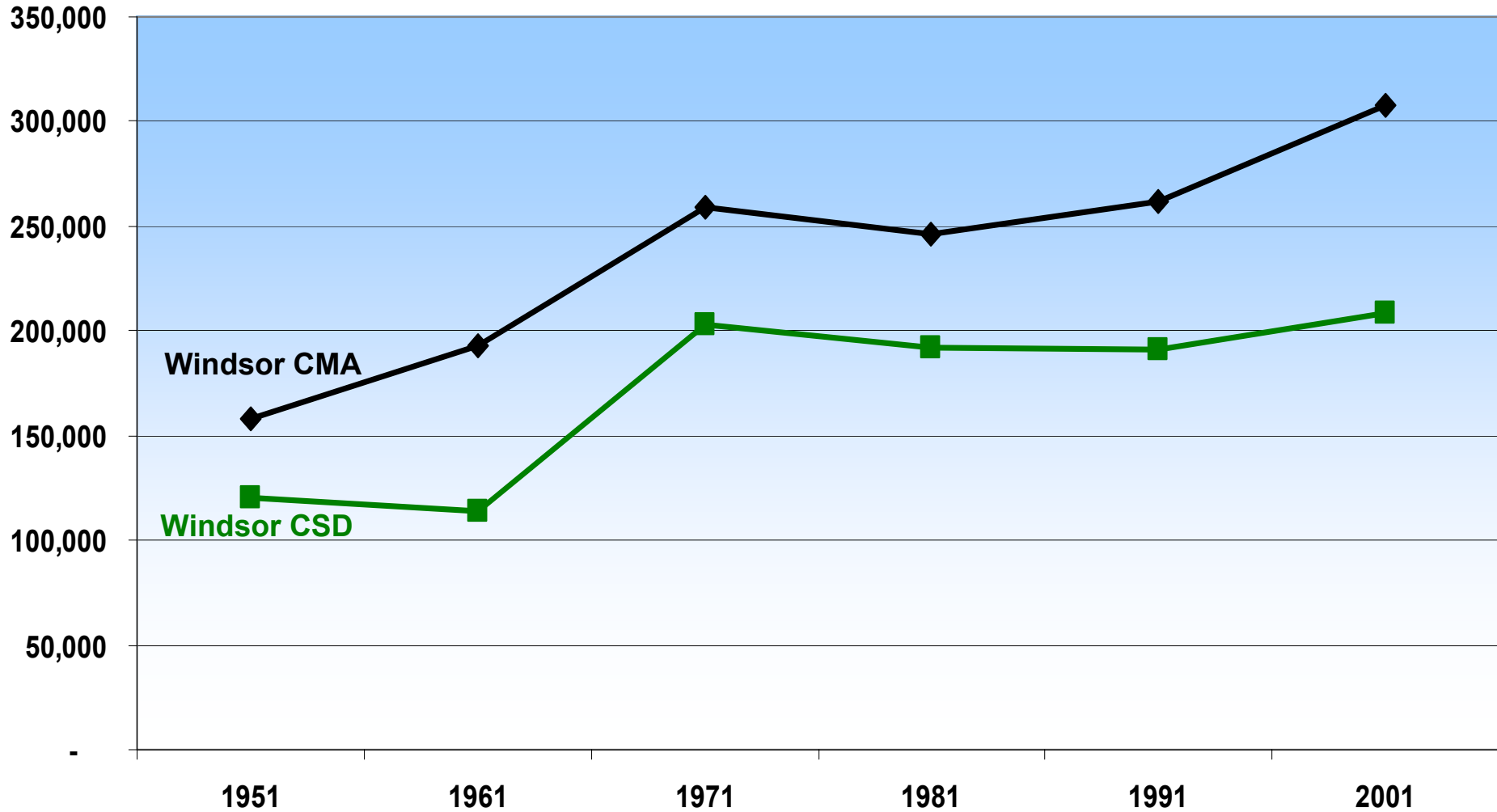


# Core City As Percentage of Population for Ontario CMAs, 2001



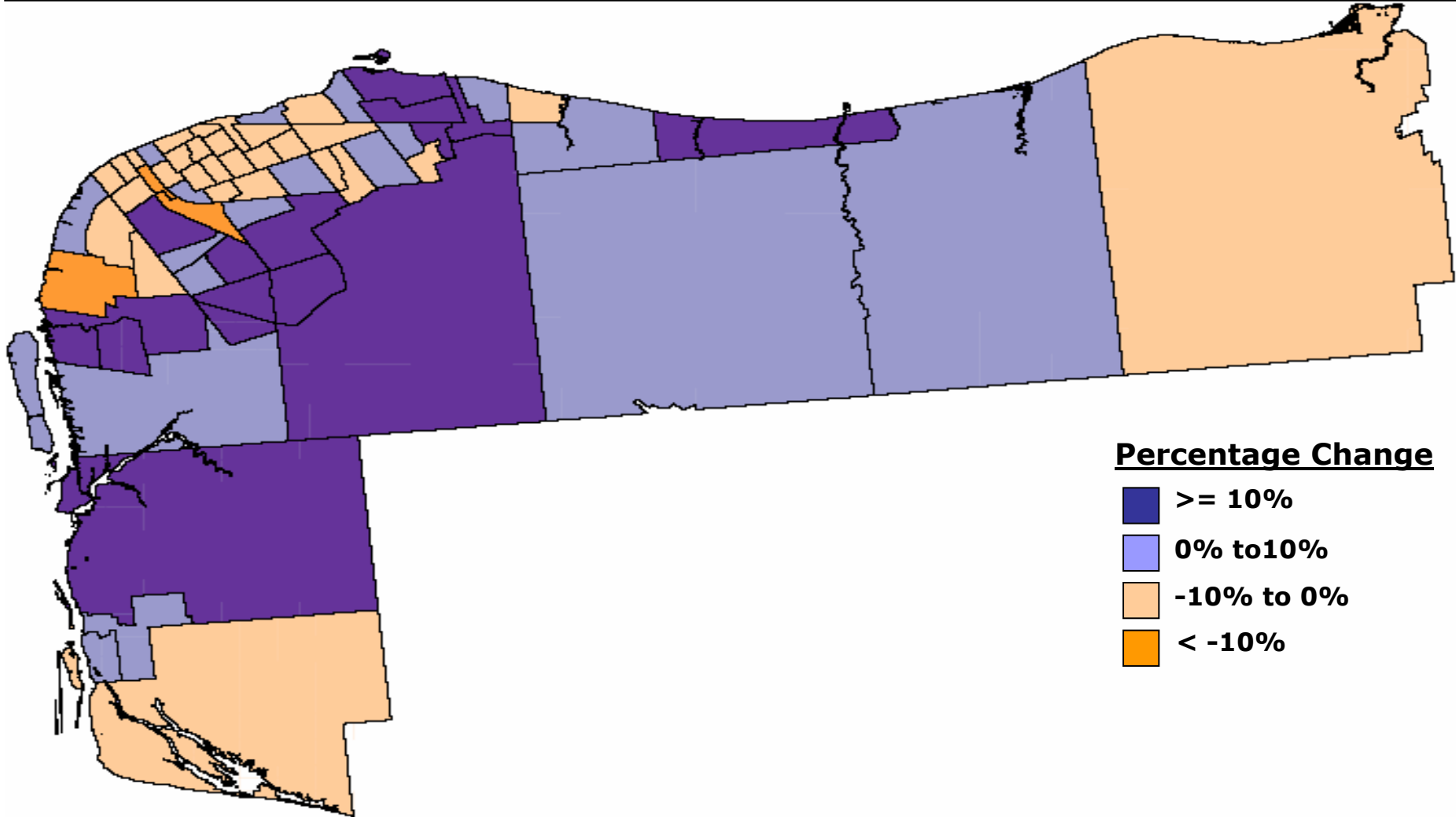


# Population 1961 to 2001, Windsor CMA and Windsor CSD



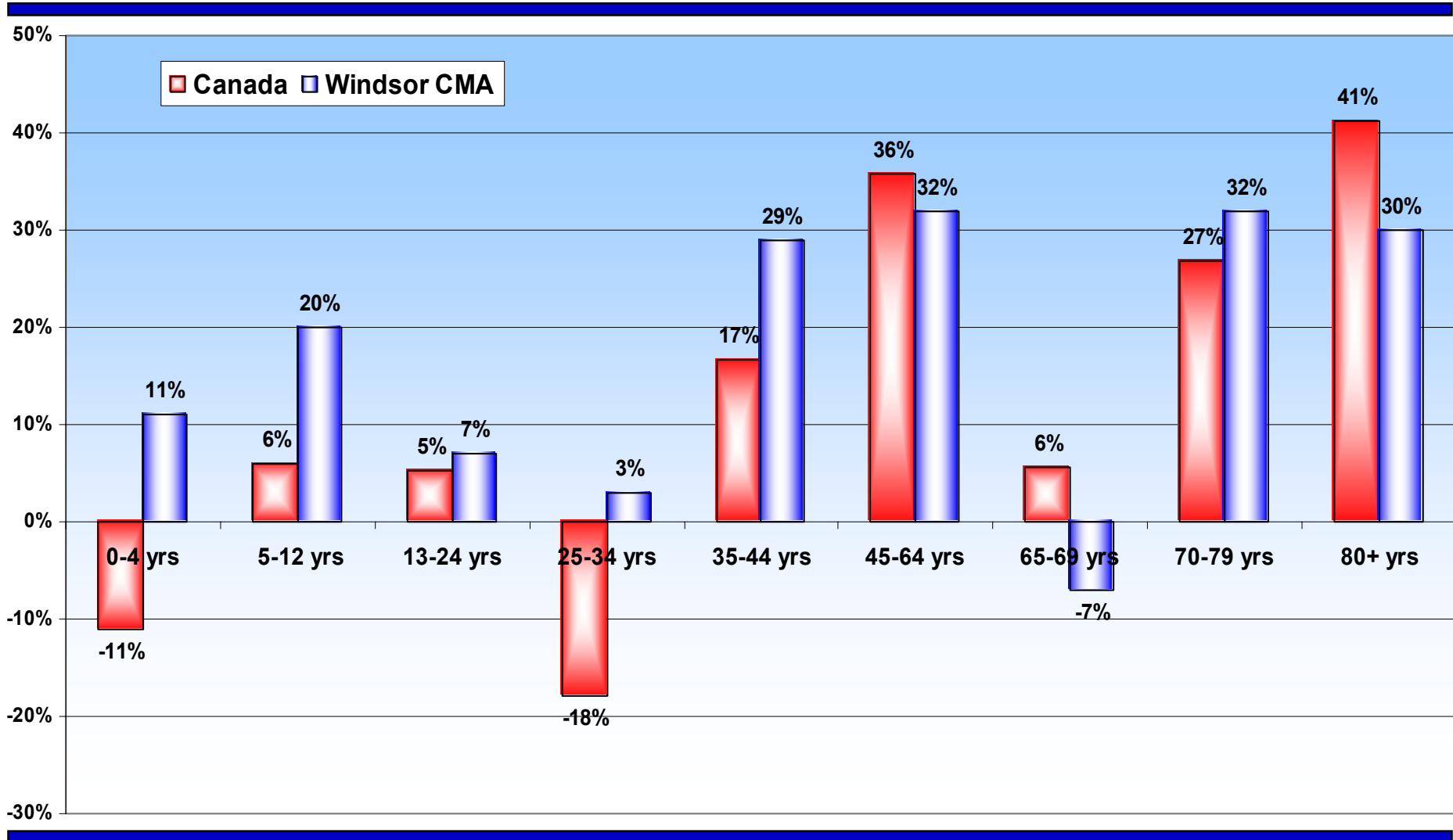


# Population Change for Windsor CMA, 1996 - 2001





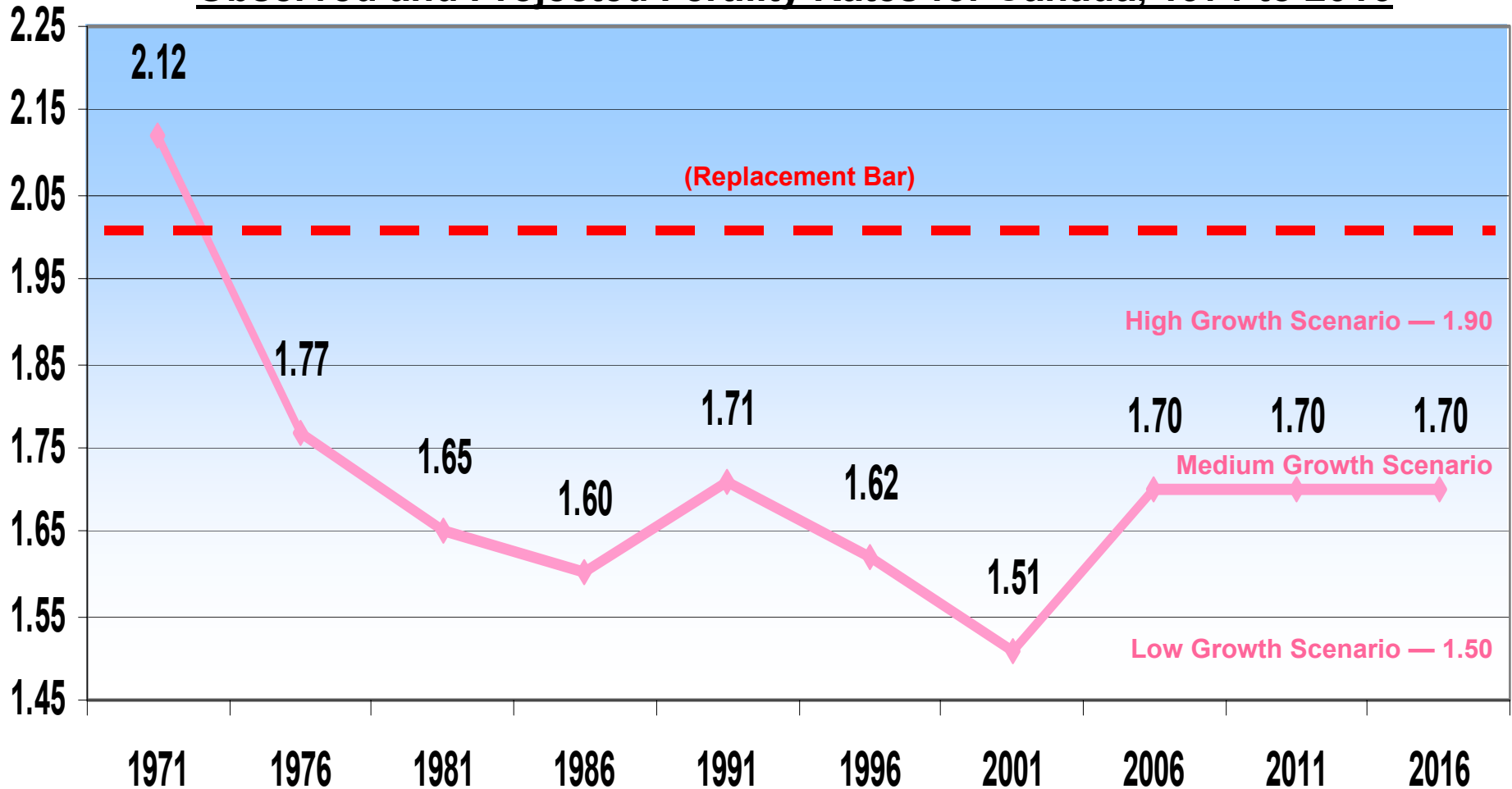
# Population Change 1991 to 2001, Selected Age Groups, Canada and Windsor CMA





# Canada's Fertility Rate has Not Contributed to Population Replacement Since the Early 1970's

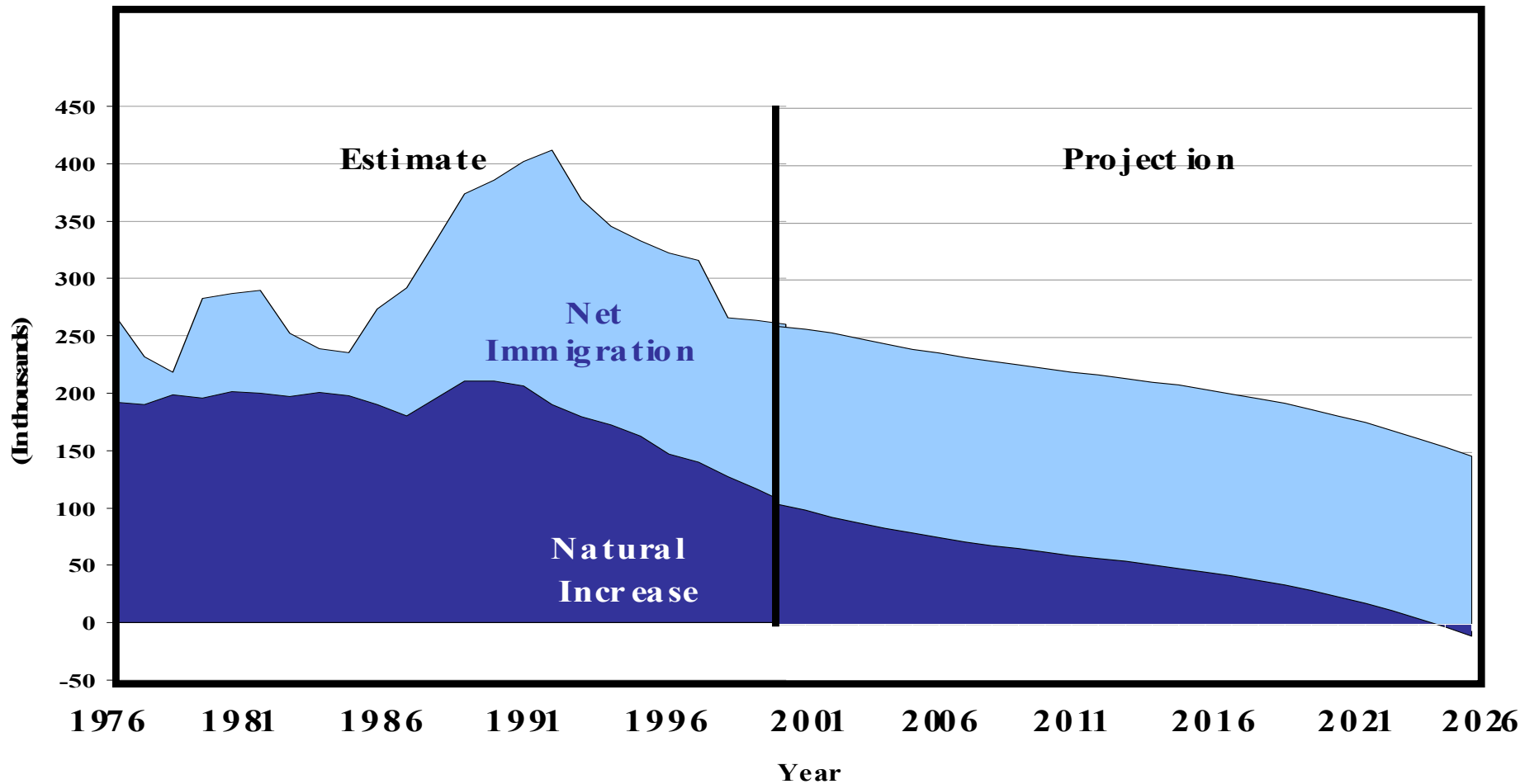
**Observed and Projected Fertility Rates for Canada, 1971 to 2016**

**3.2%** of persons moved to a different province or territory

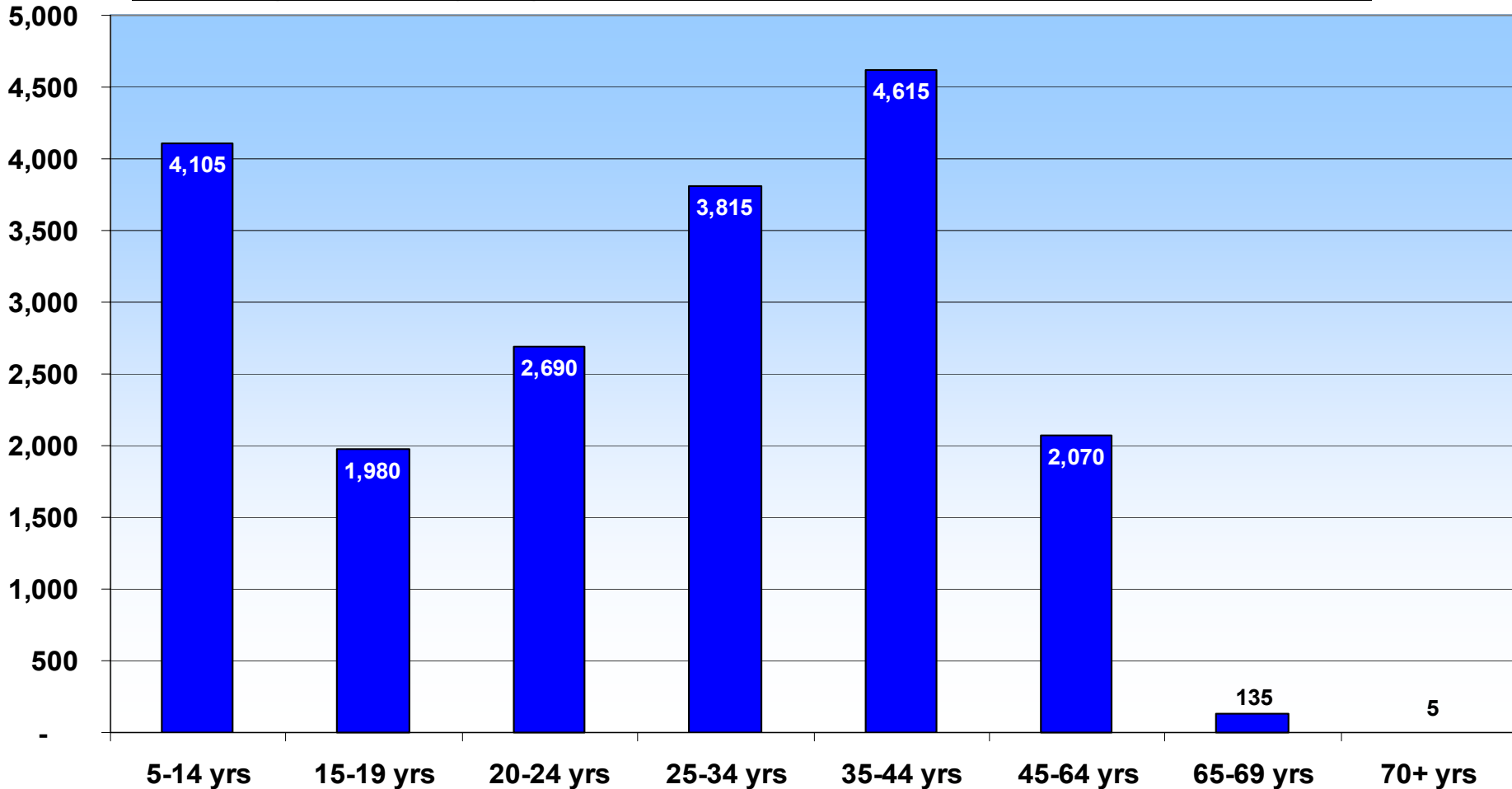

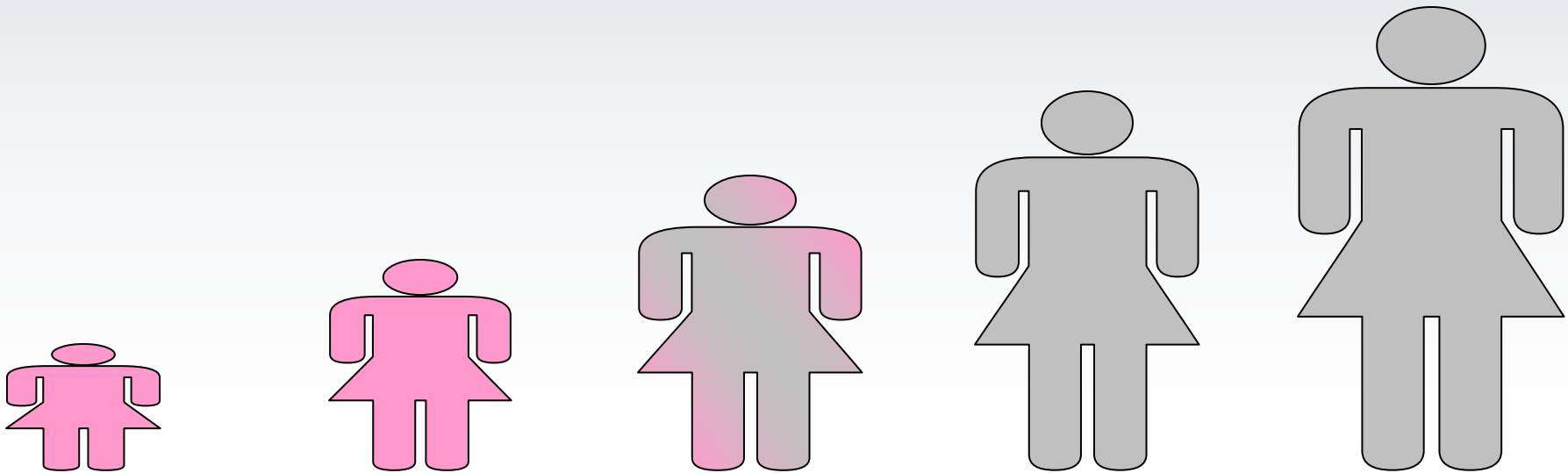

**Net Migration by Age Group for Windsor CMA, 1996 to 2001**



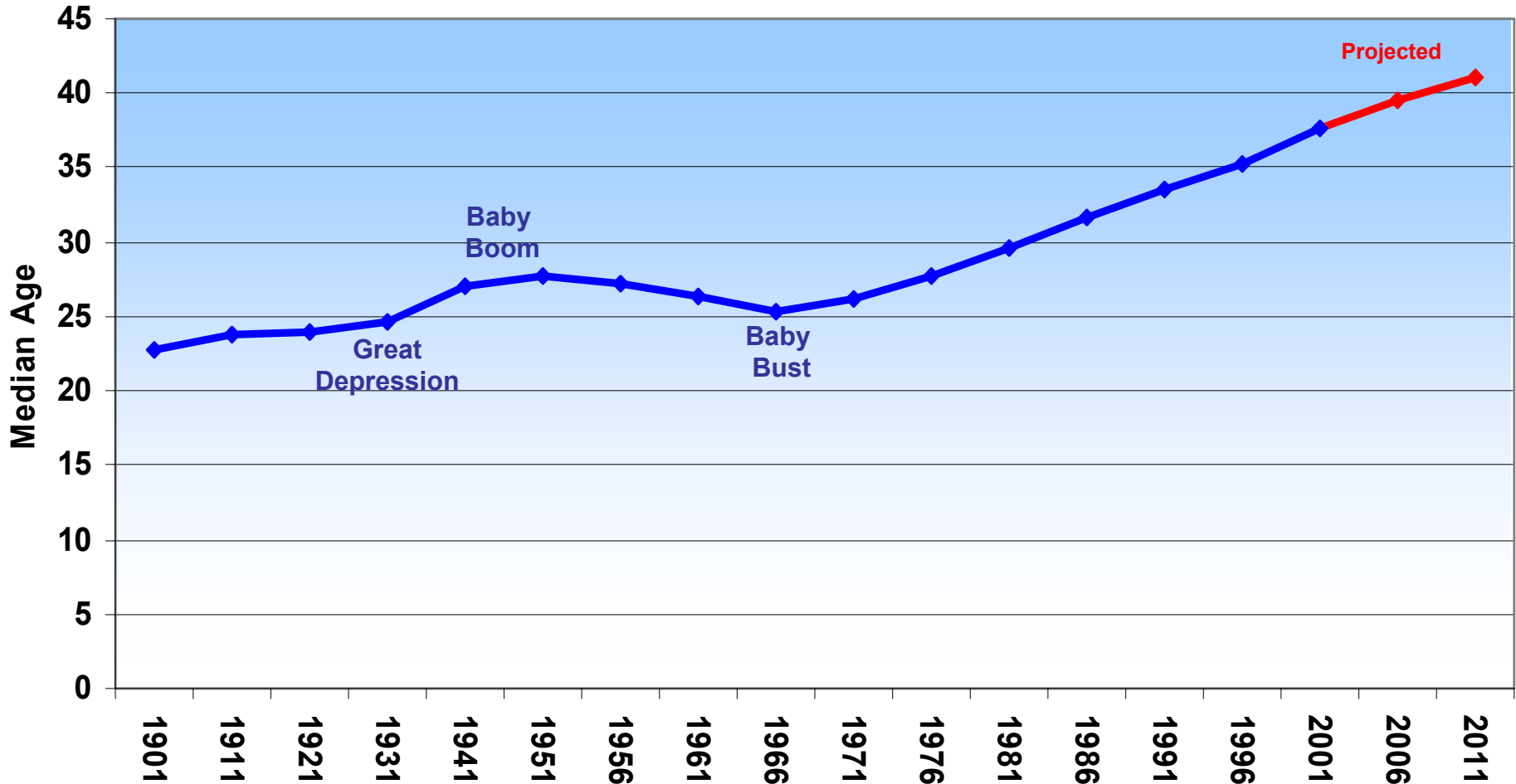

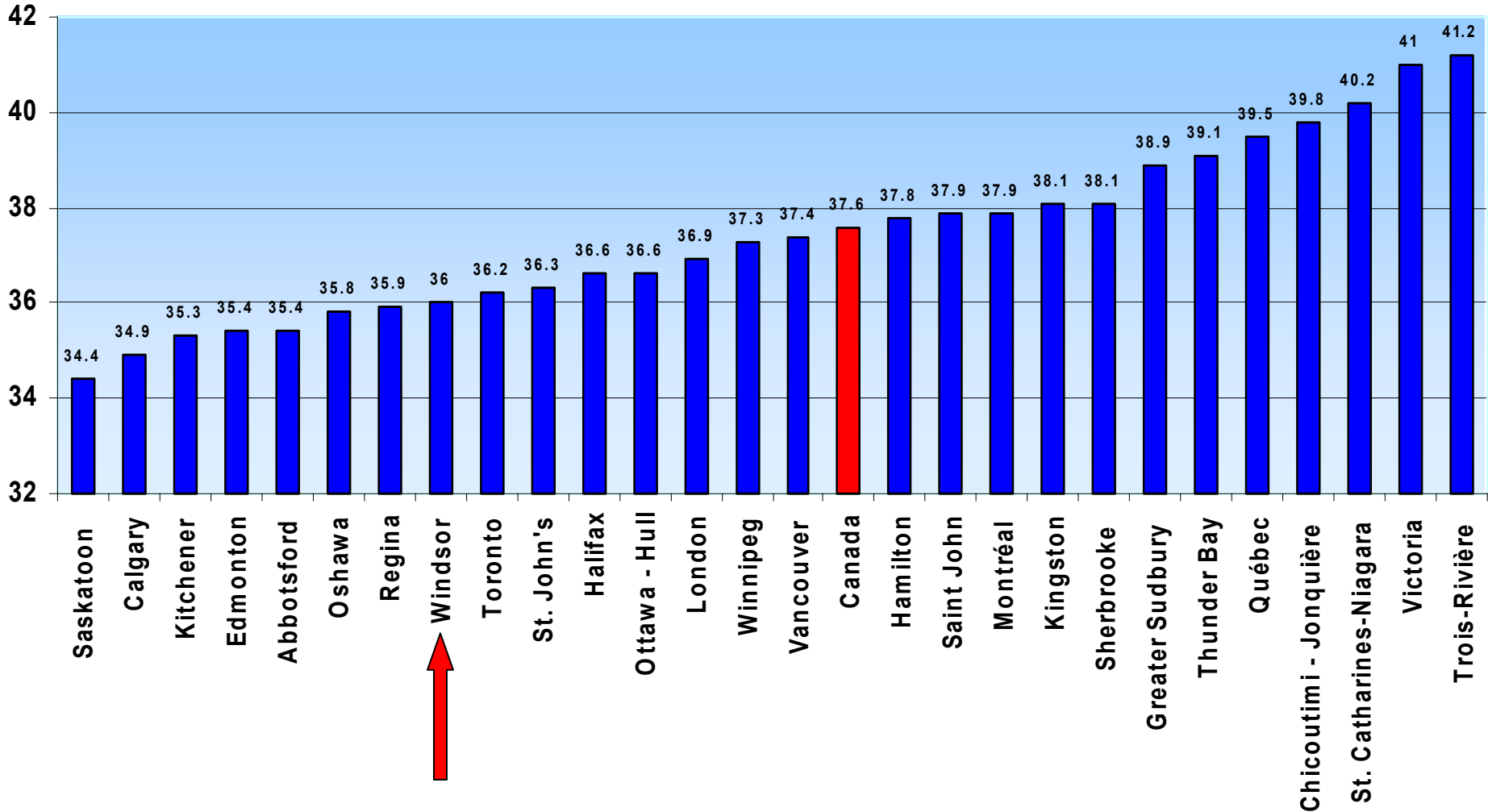
# The Canadian Population is Growing Older, Faster

## Median Age of the Canadian Population, 1901-2011



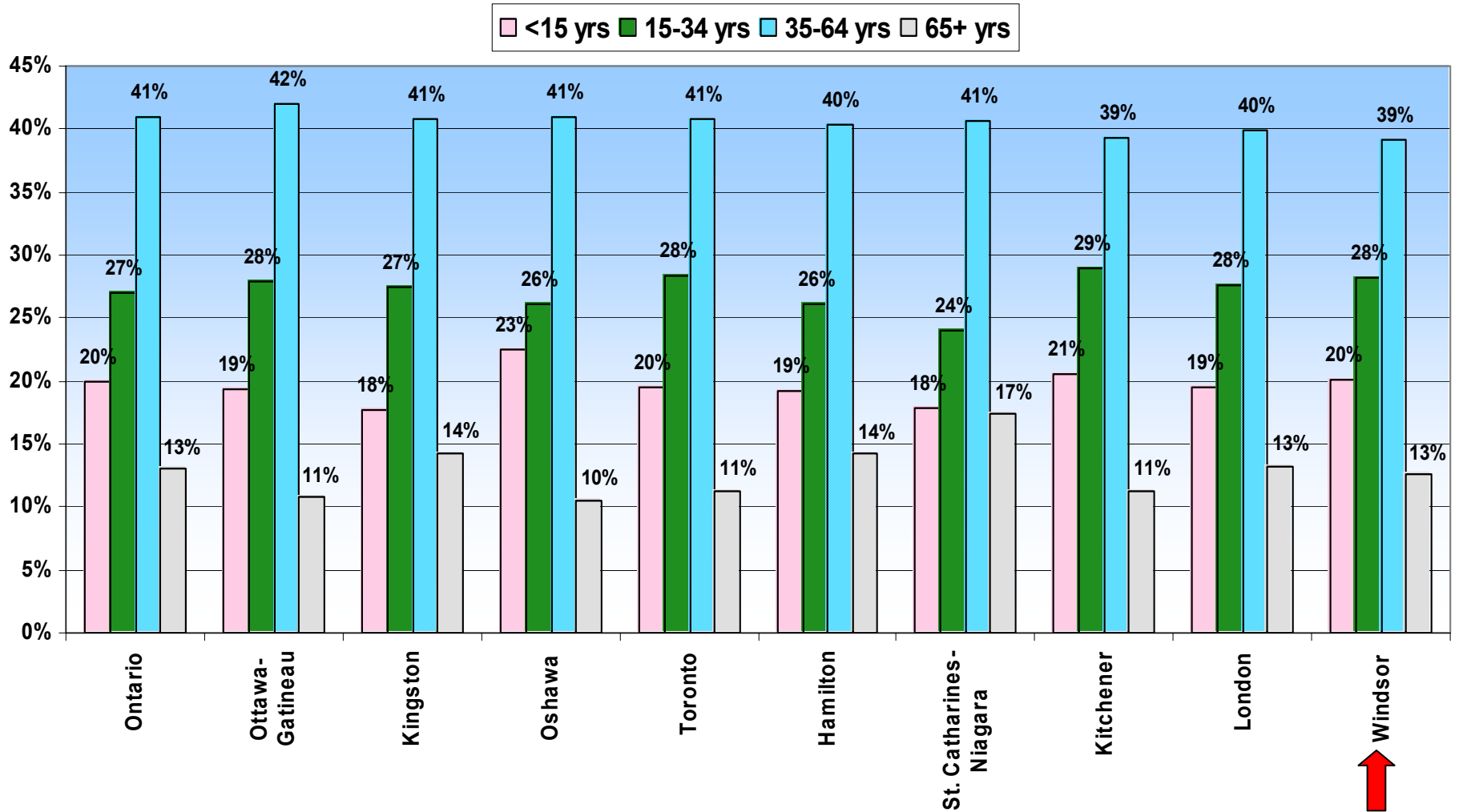


# Median Age by Census Metropolitan Area, 2001



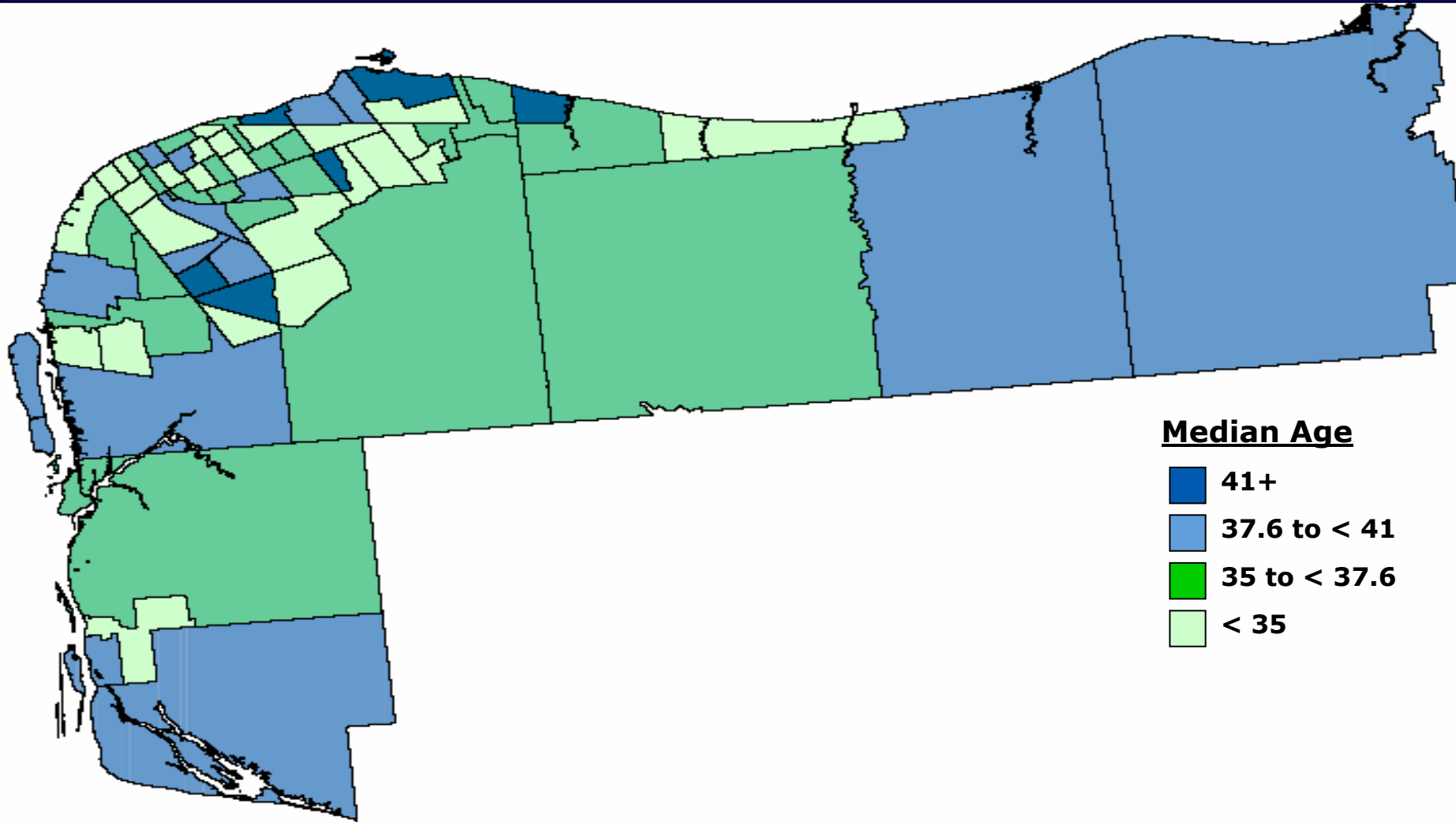


# Proportion of Population by Age Groups in Ontario CMAs, 2001



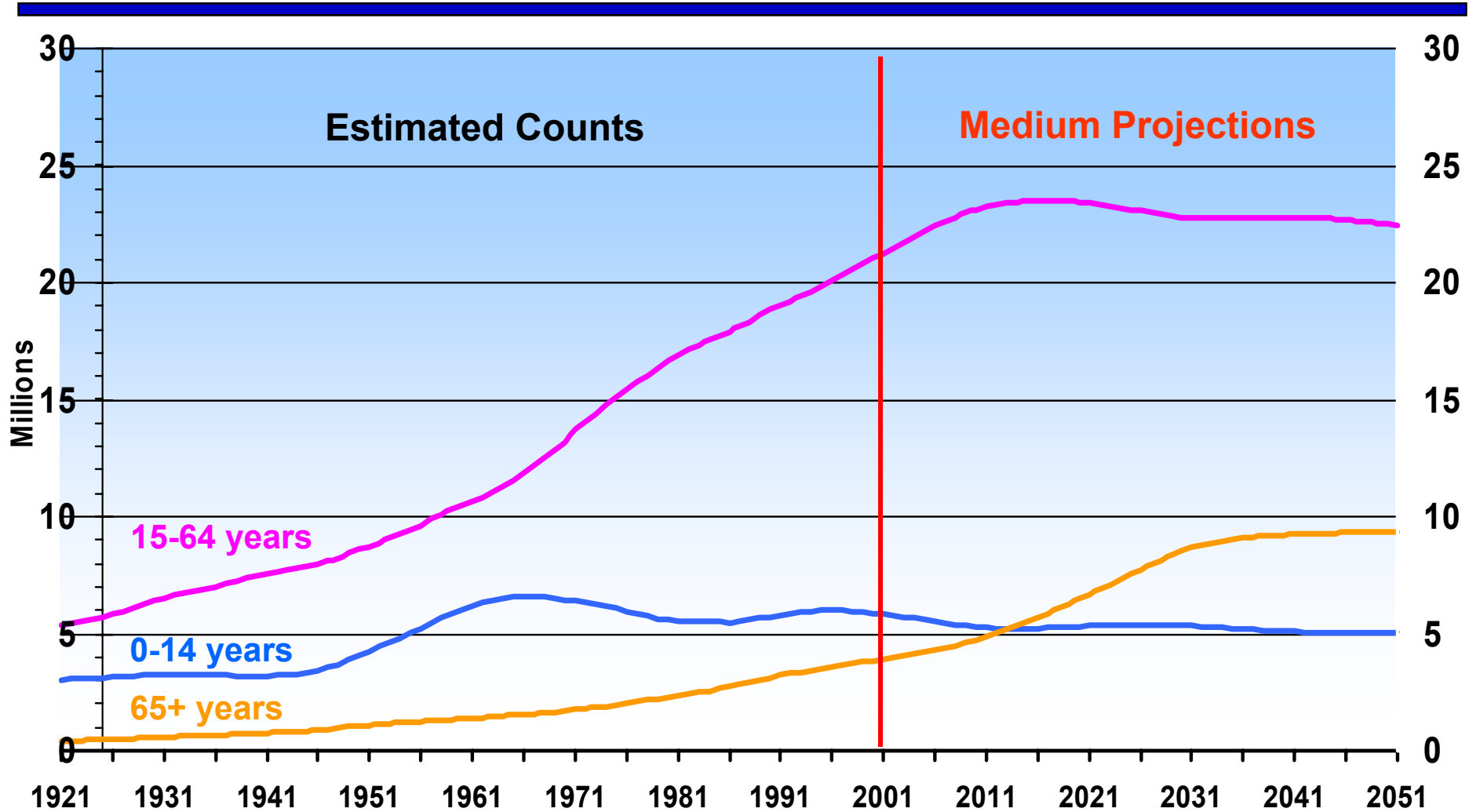


# Median Age for Windsor CMA, 1996 to 2001





# Canadian Population Aged 15-64, 1921 to 2051

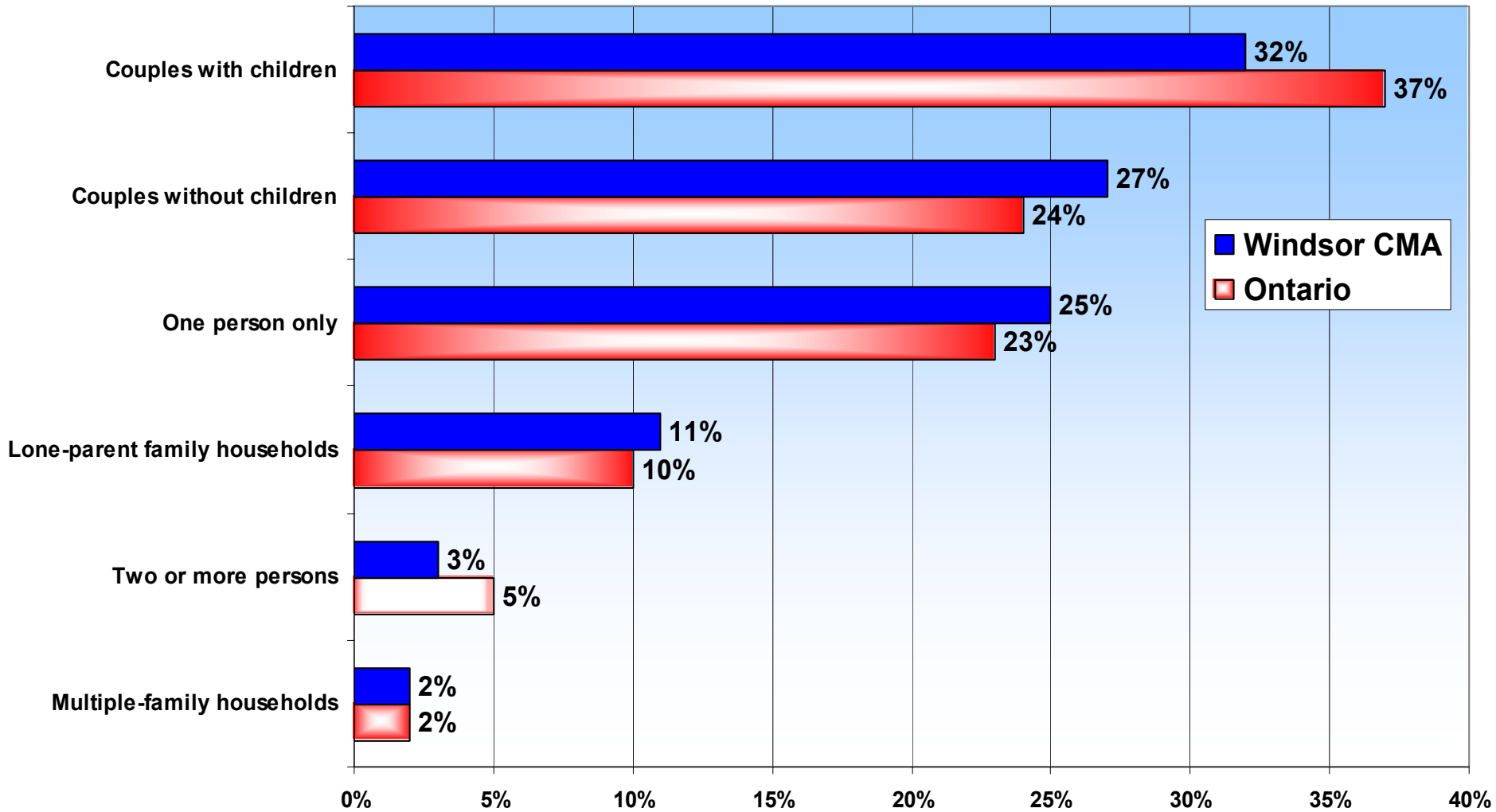

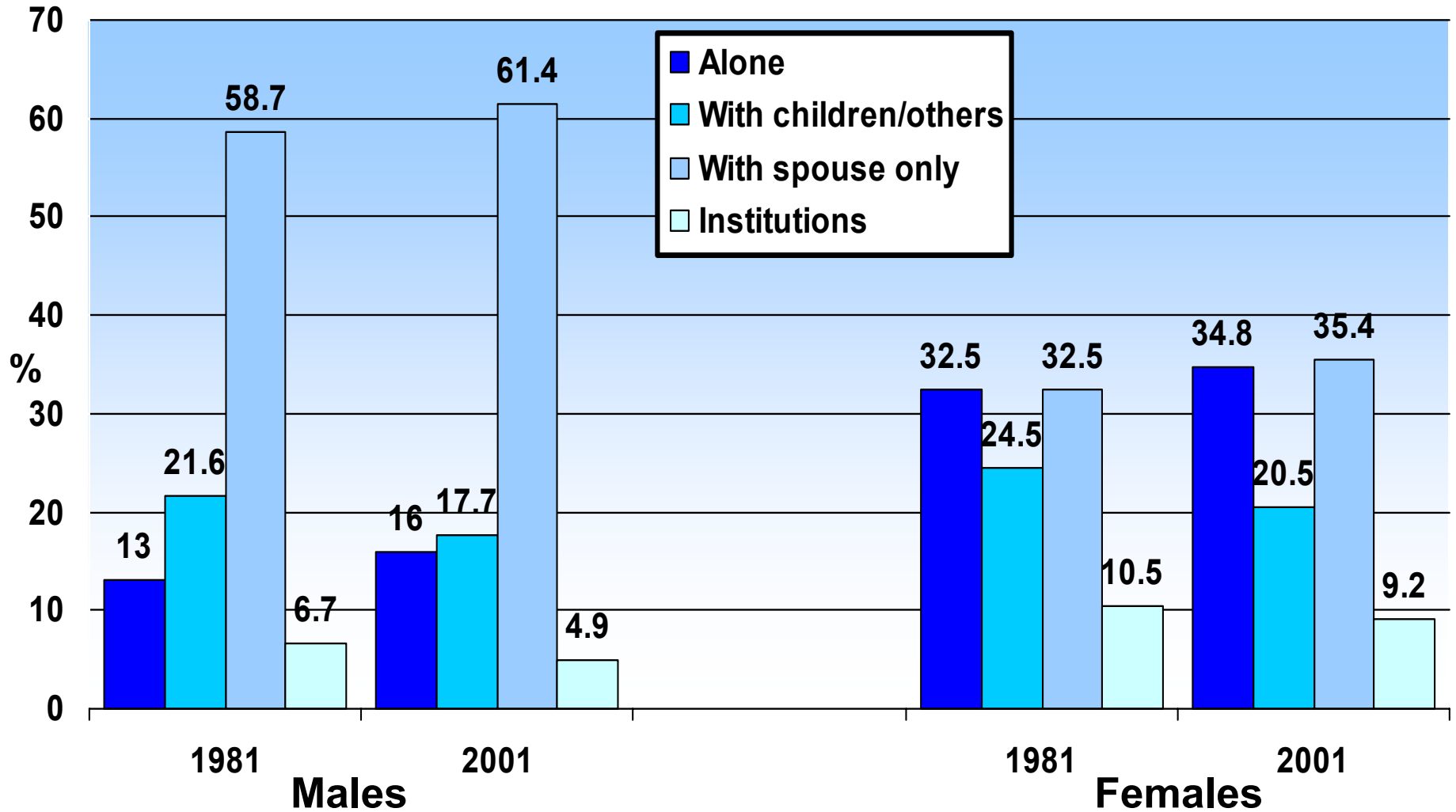


# Private Households in Ontario and Windsor CMA, 2001



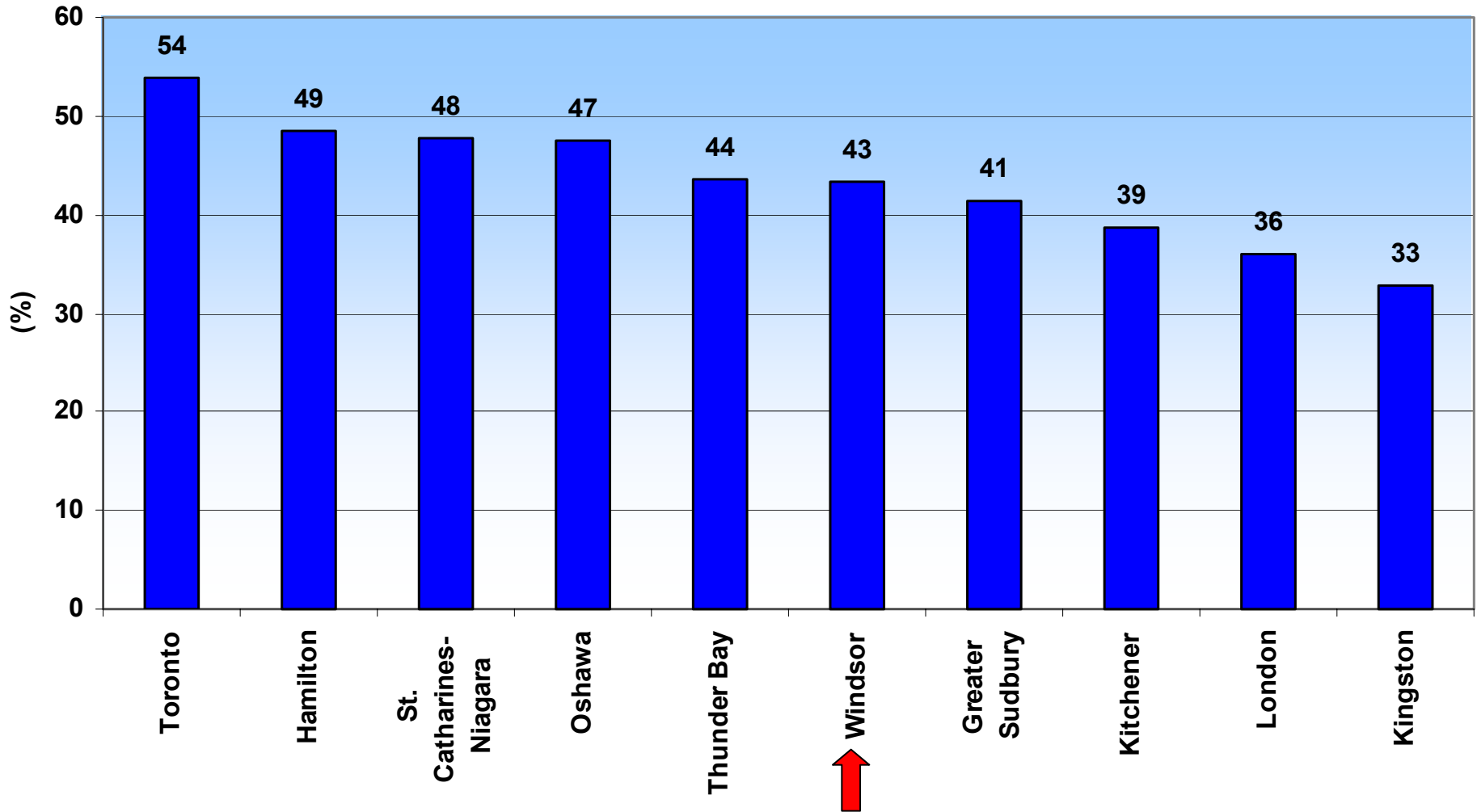


# Living Arrangements of Seniors, Aged 65 and Over, Canada, 1981 and 2001





# Percentage of Adult Children Aged 20-29 Living with Parents, Ontario CMAs, 2001

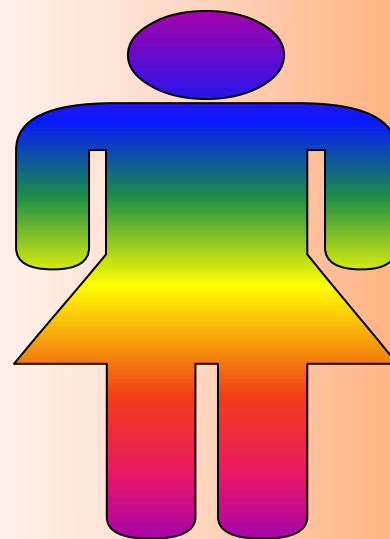
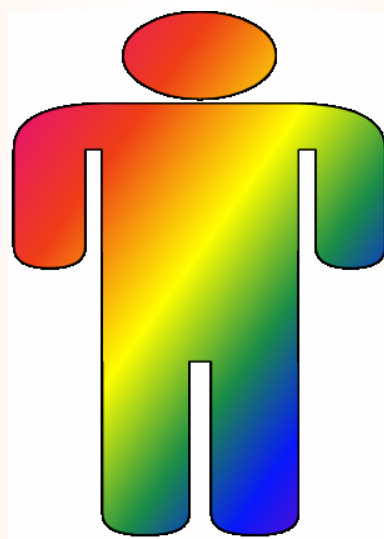
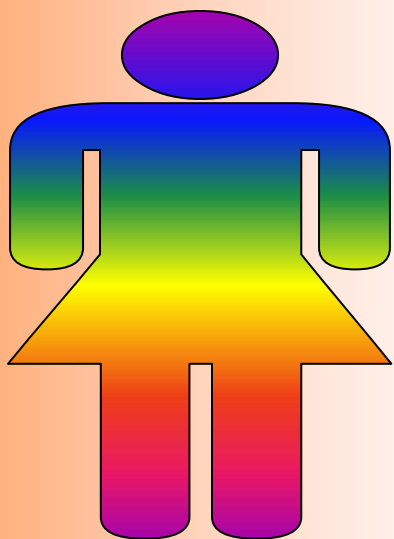

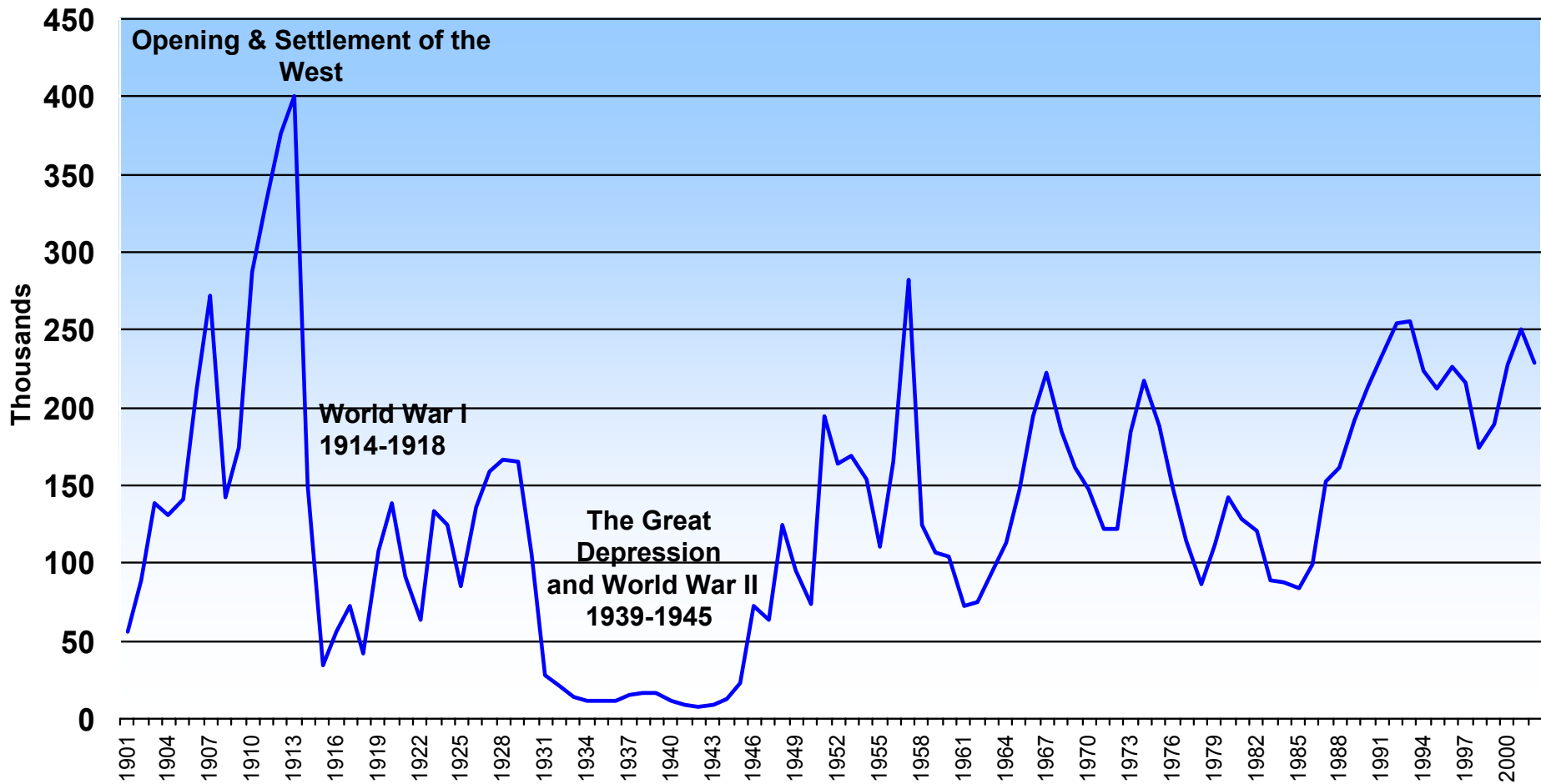

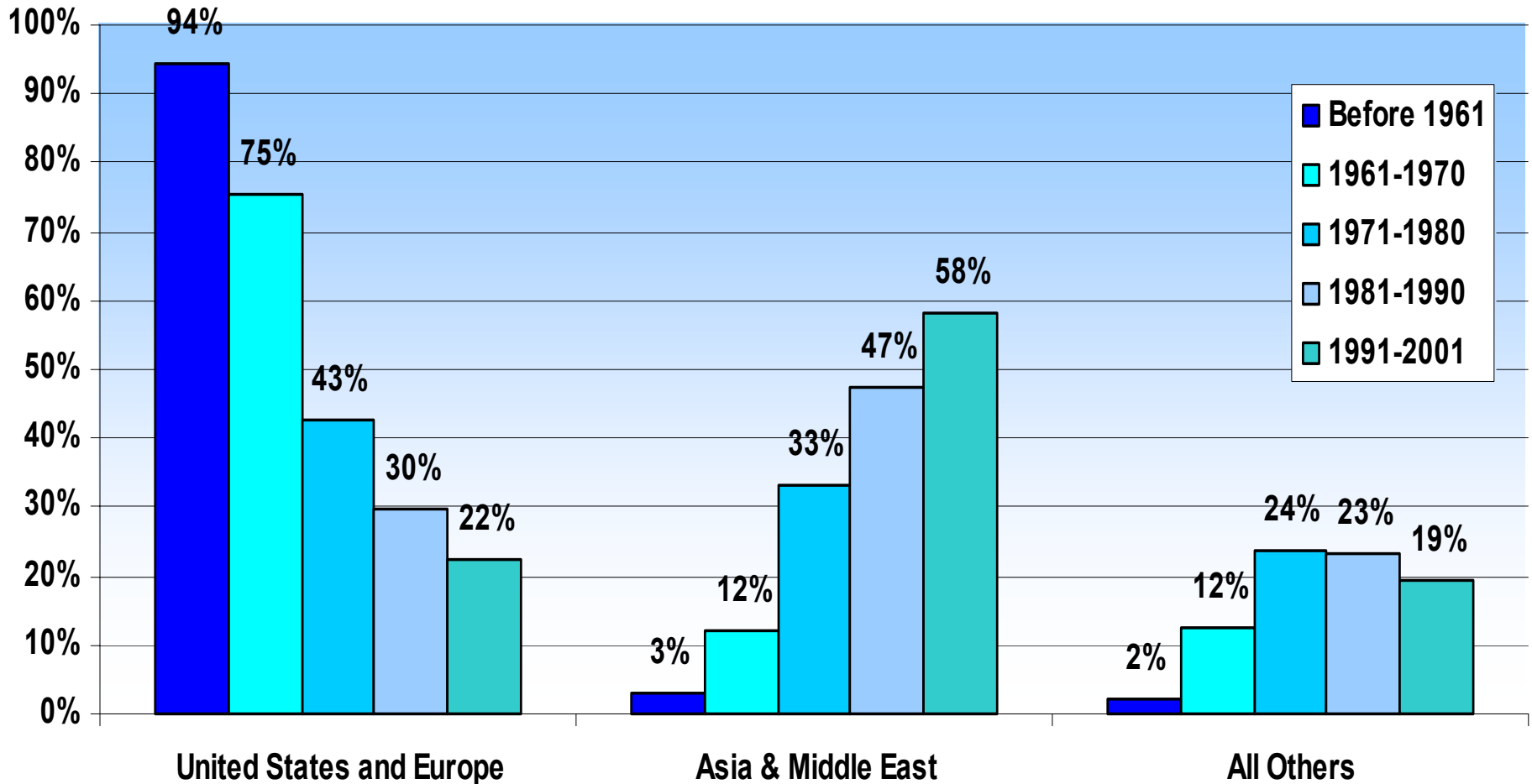
## Annual flow of immigrants admitted to Canada, 1901-2001





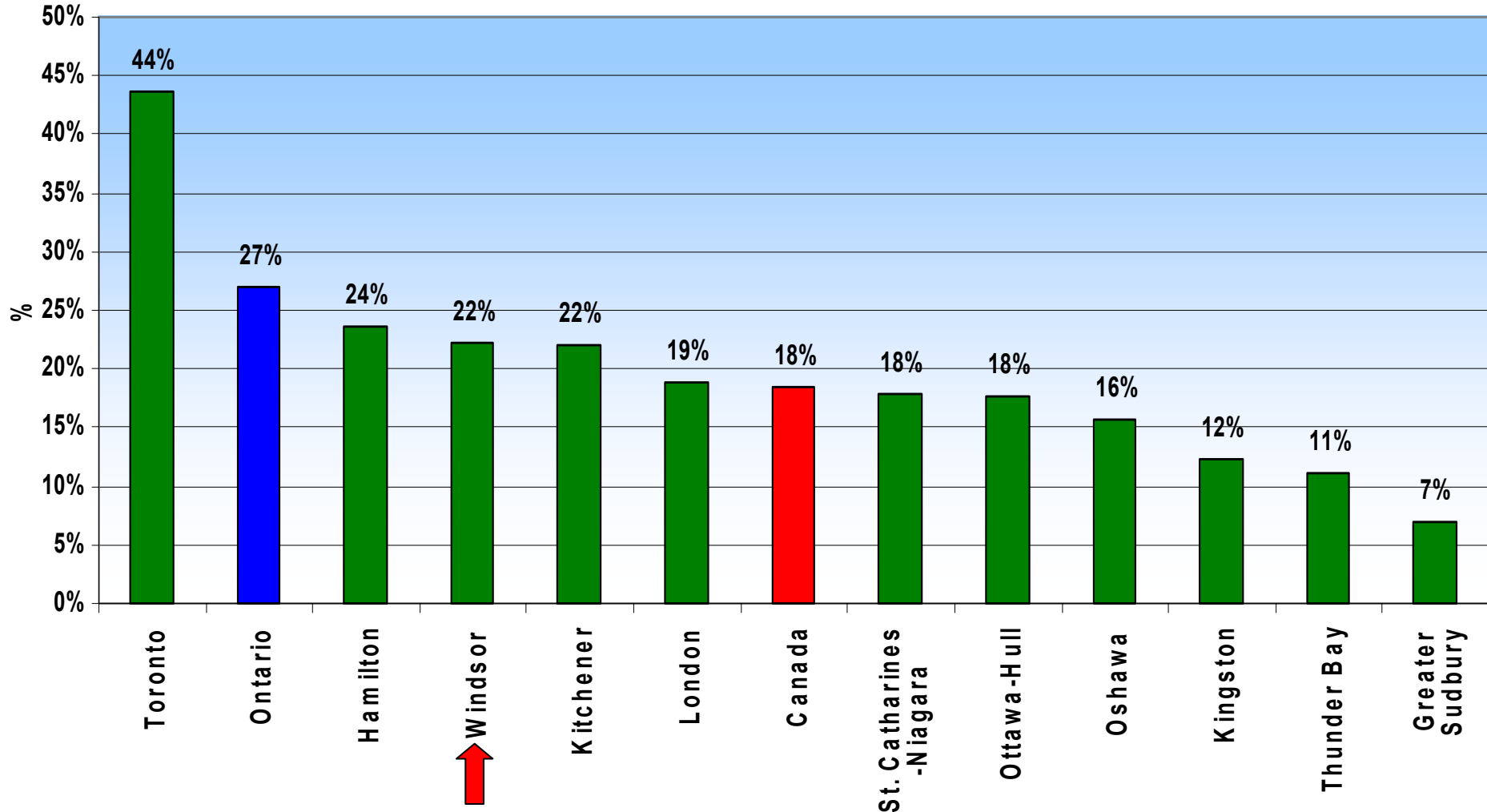
# *Immigrants to Canada are Increasingly from Asia and the Middle East*

## Place of Birth of Immigrants by Period of Immigration, Canada



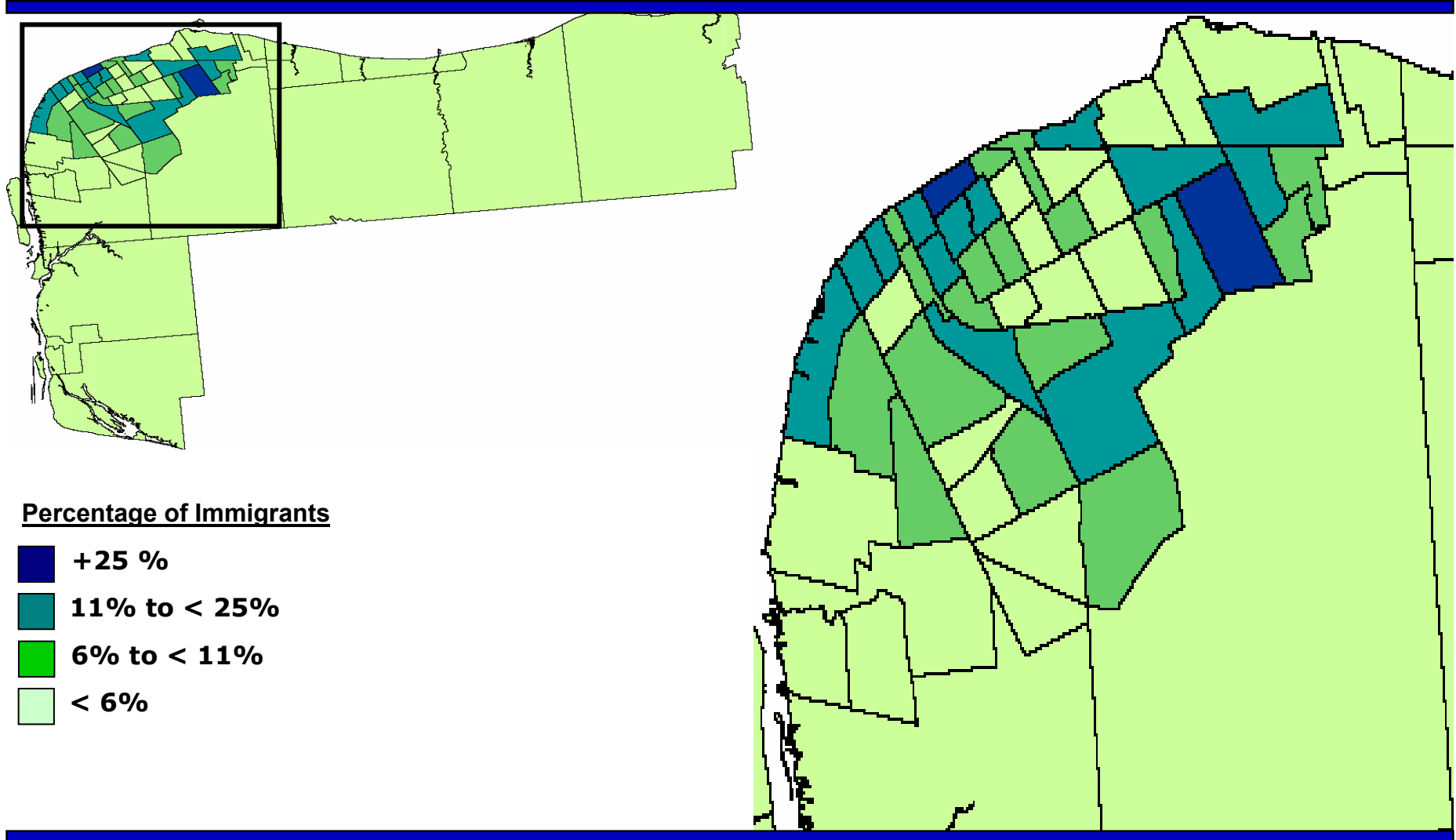


# Percent of Foreign Born Population In Ontario CMAs, 2001



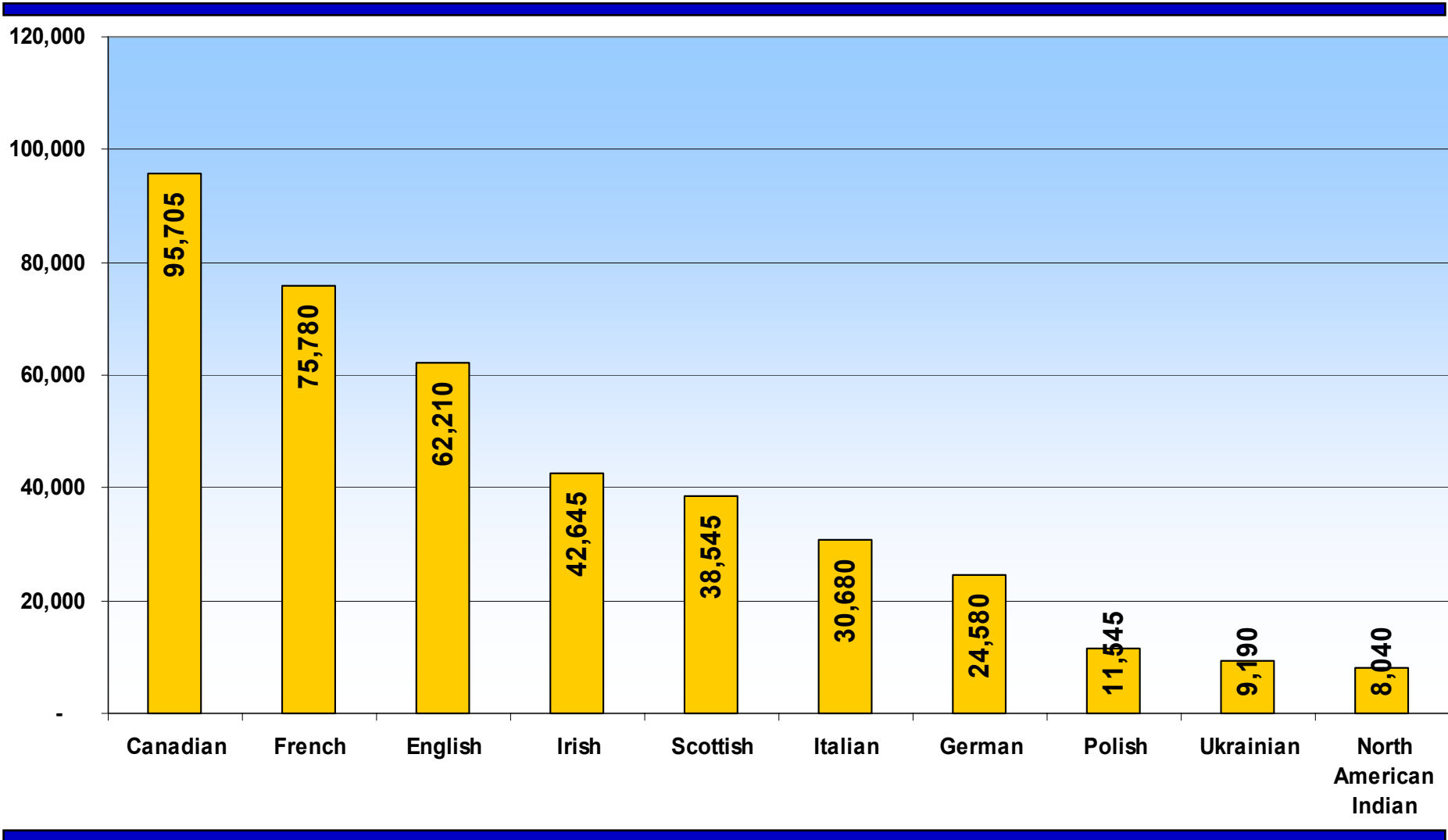


# Immigrants of the 1990's As A Percentage of Total Population of the Windsor CMA, 2001



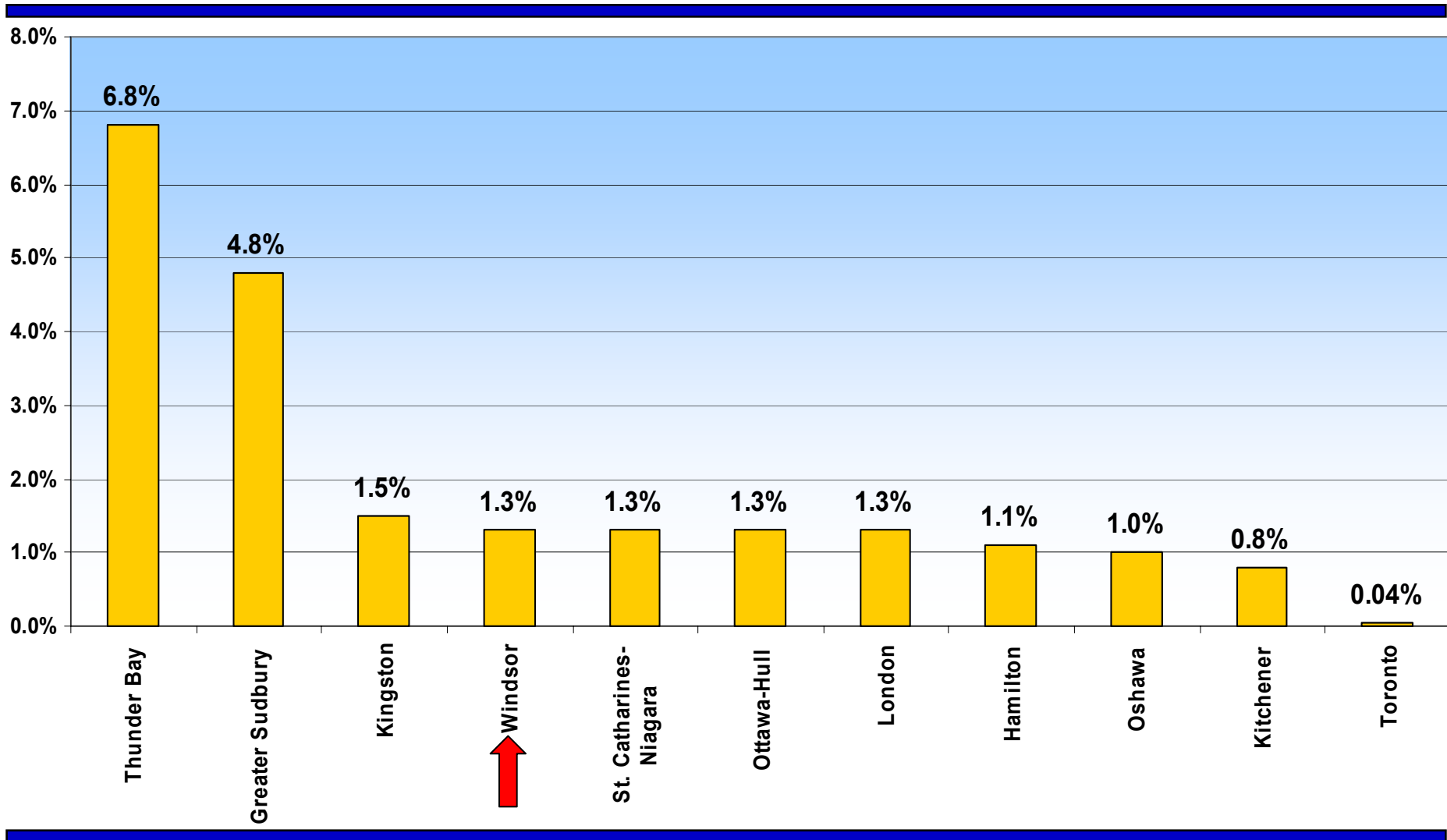


# Top Ten Ethnic Origins for Windsor CMA by Population, 2001





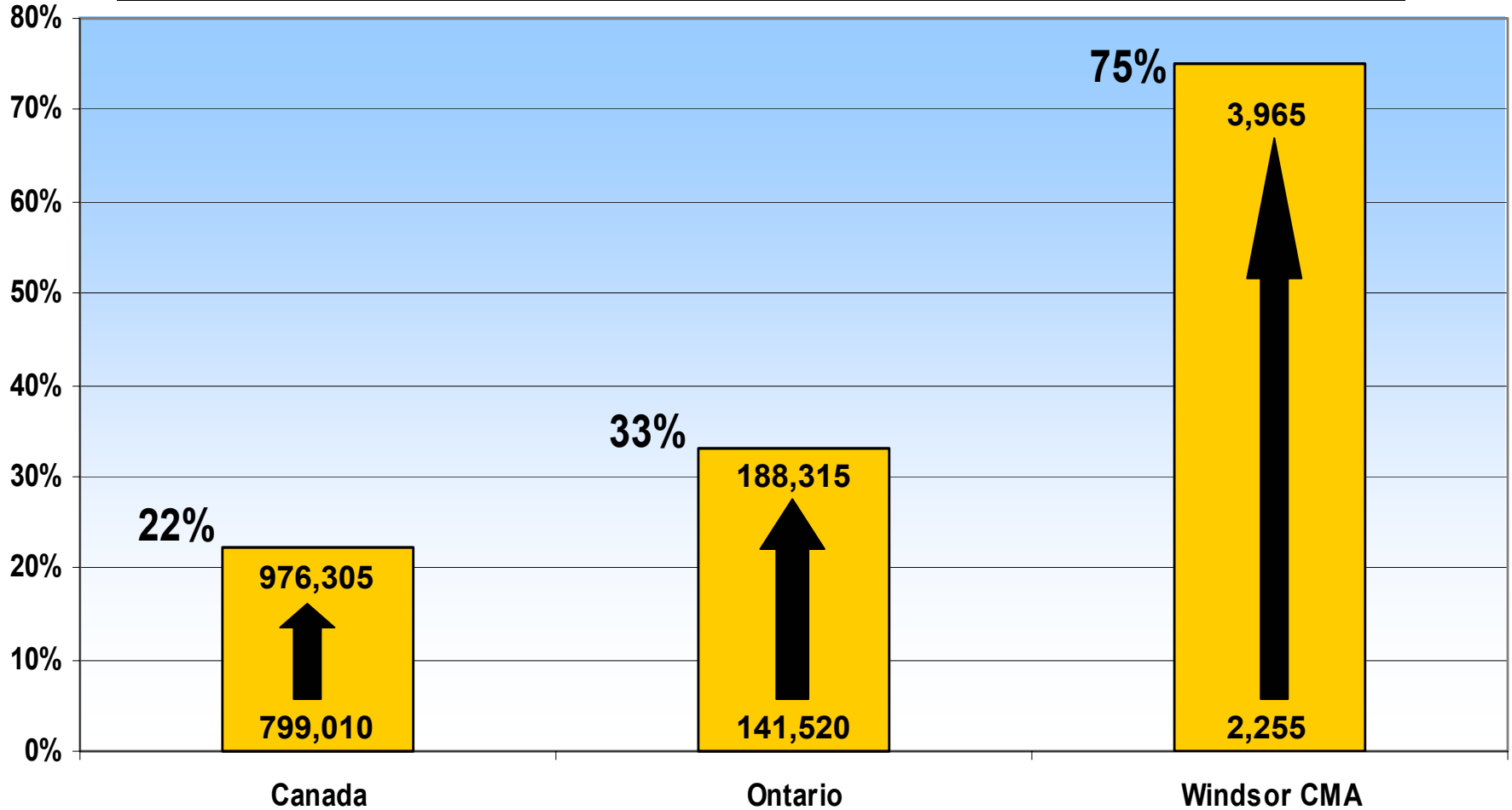
# Aboriginal Population As A Percentage of Population for Ontario CMAs, 2001

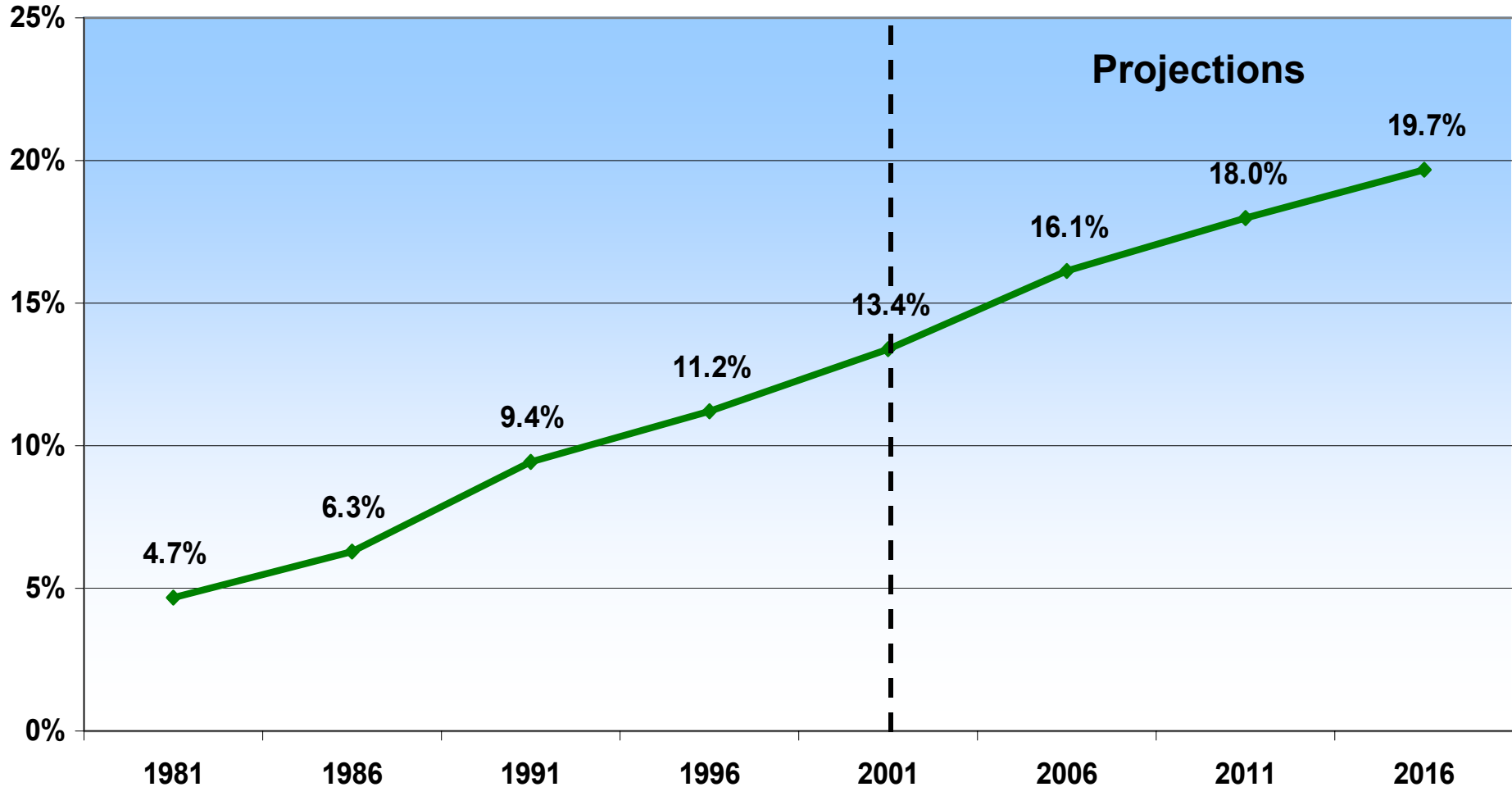

# *The Visible Minority Population in Canada Has Nearly Tripled Since 1981*

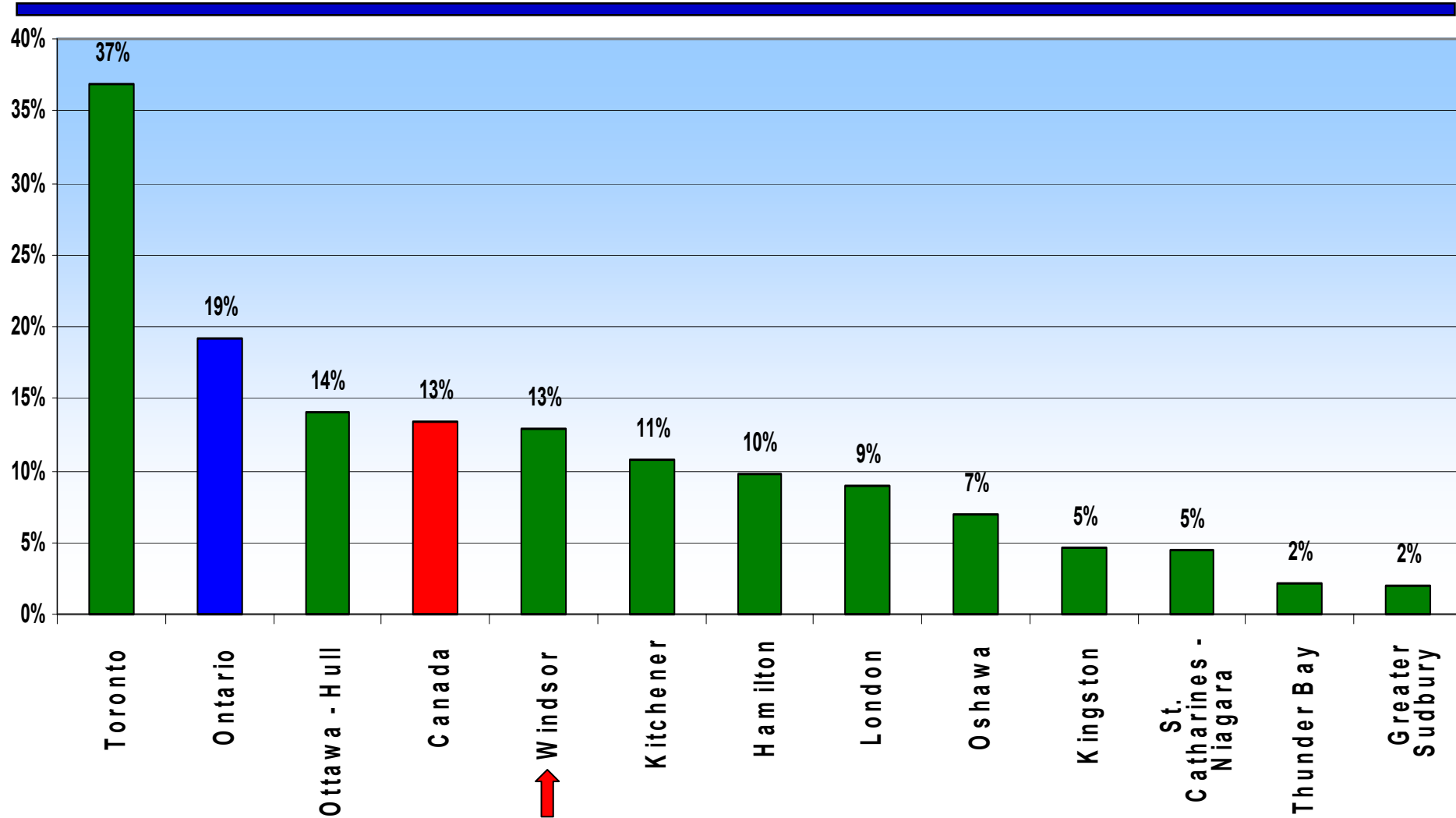
## Percentage of Visible Minority Population in Canada, 1981 to 2016



Note: The above percentages are based on a medium population growth scenario

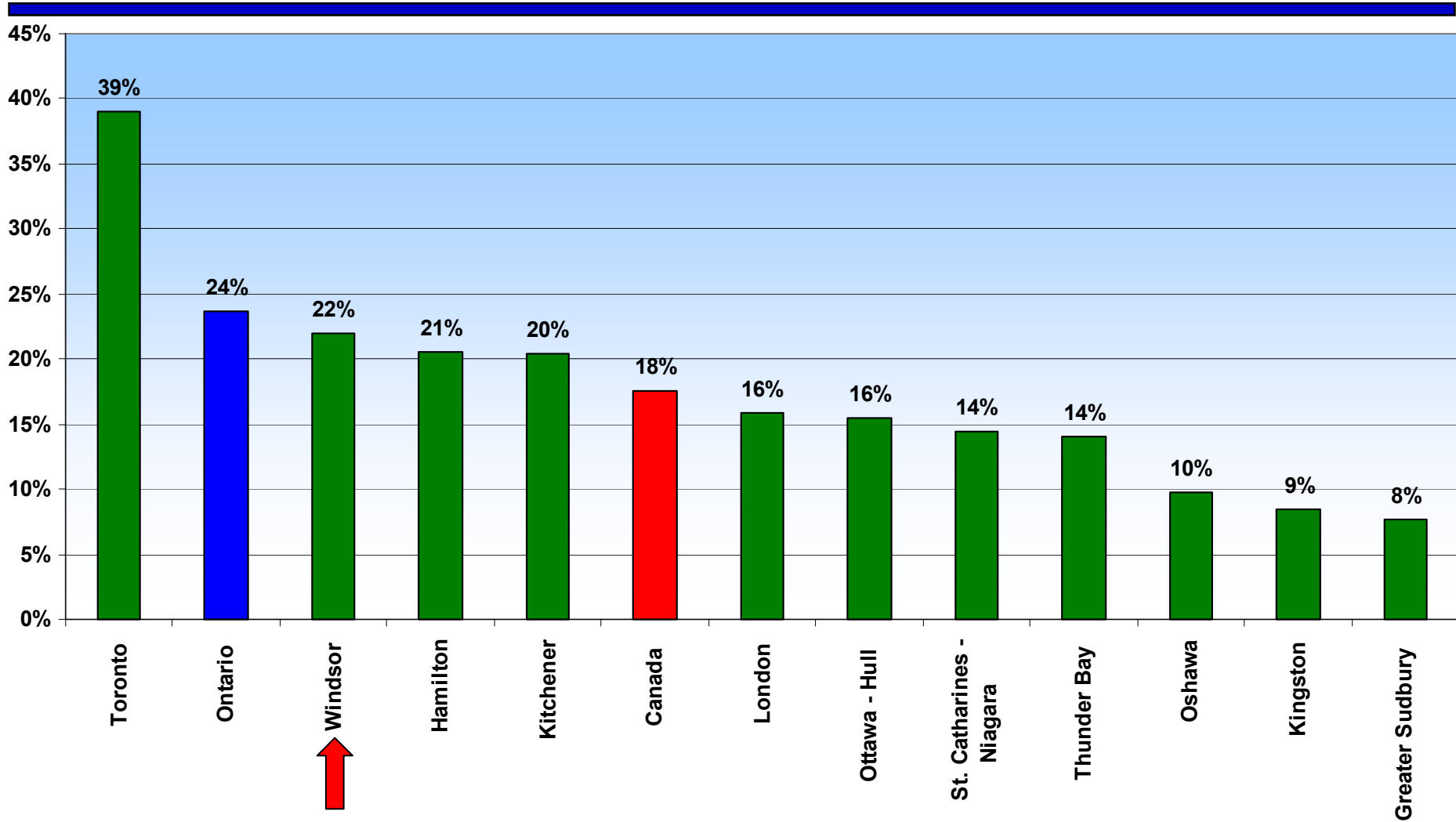


# Percentage of Visible Minority Population in Ontario CMAs, 2001



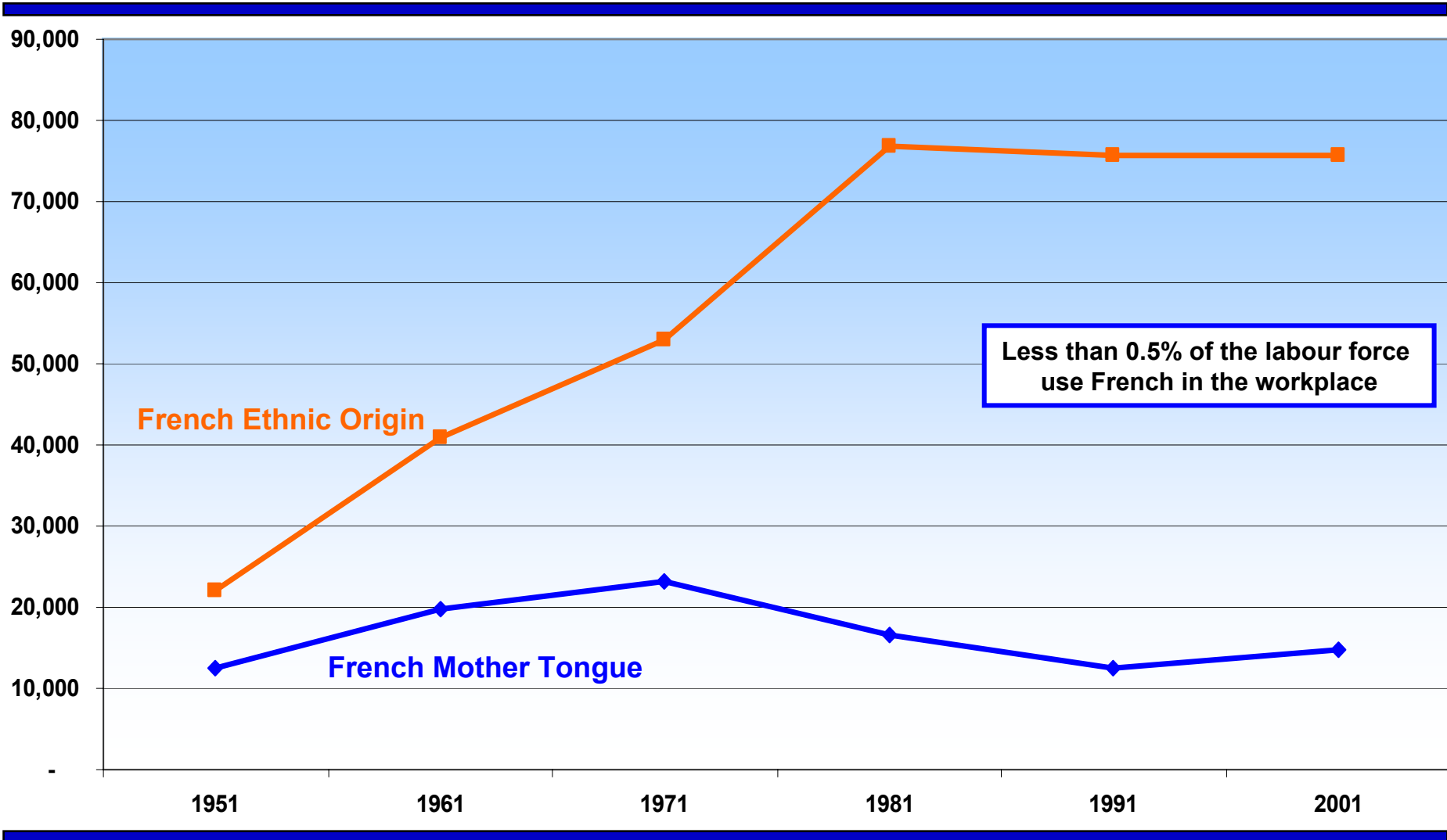


# Percentage of Mother Tongue that is Neither English or French for Ontario CMAs, 2001





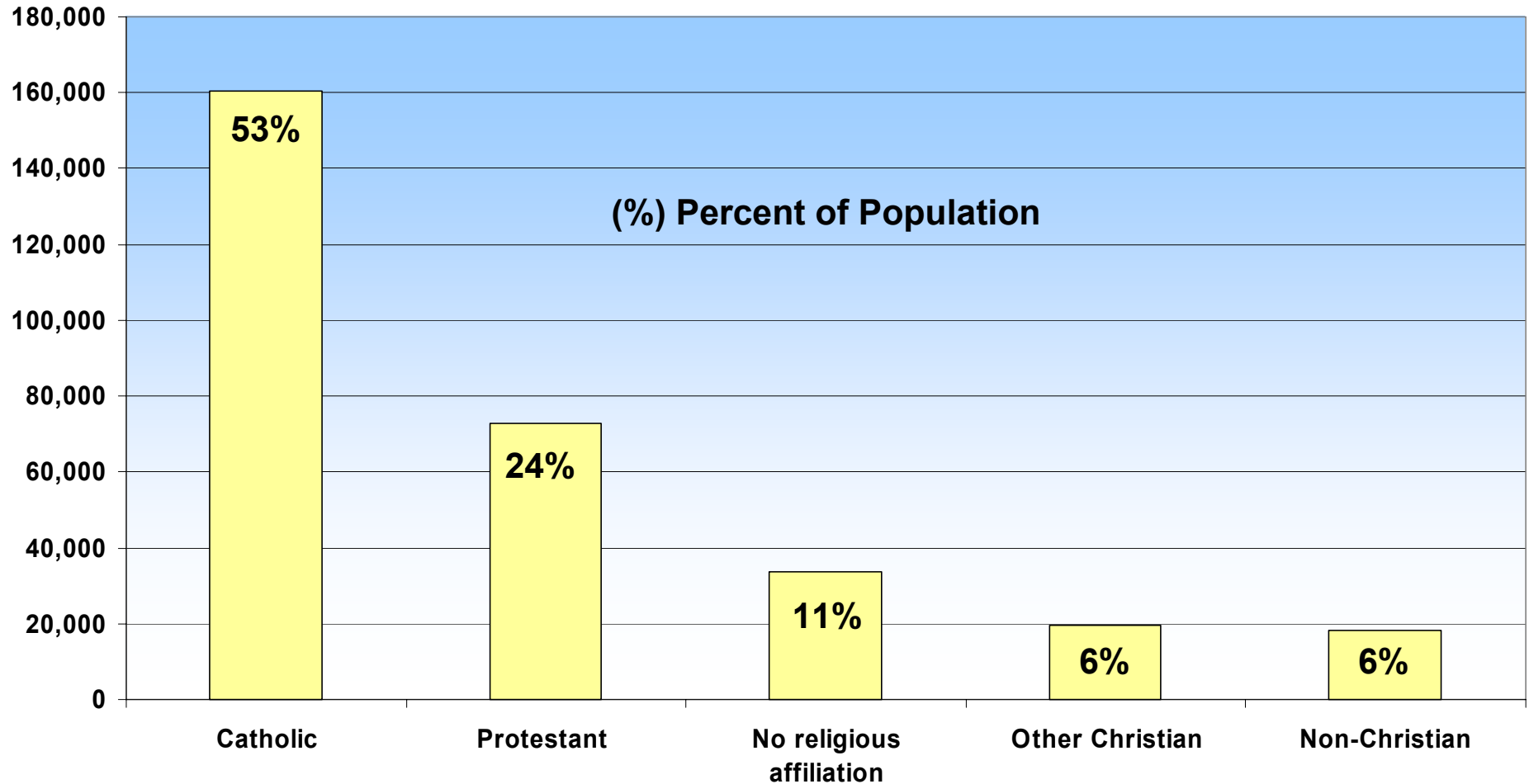
# Francophone Population in the Windsor CMA, 1951 to 2001

## **Religious Affiliation As Ranked By Population for Windsor CMA, 2001**

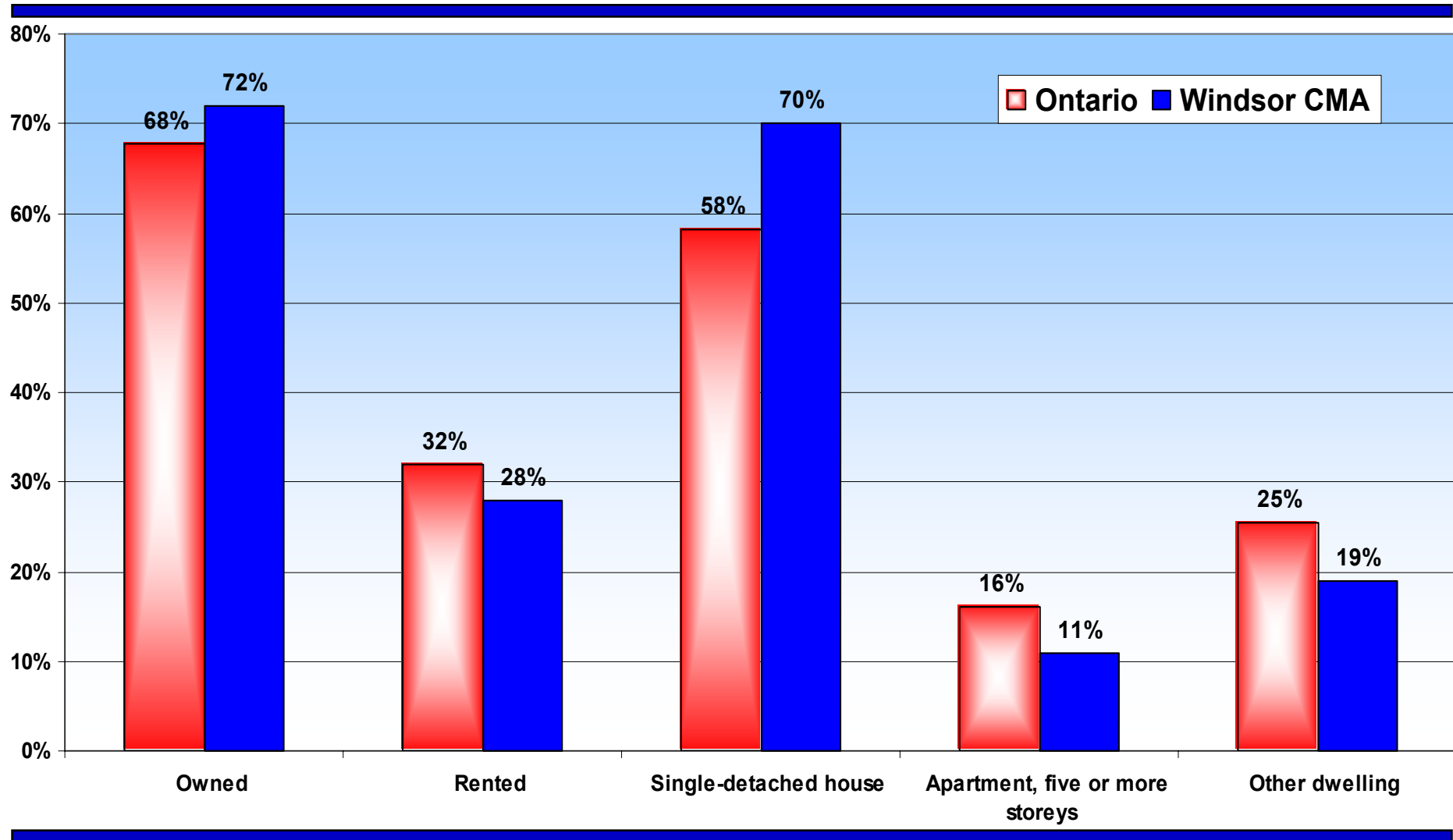

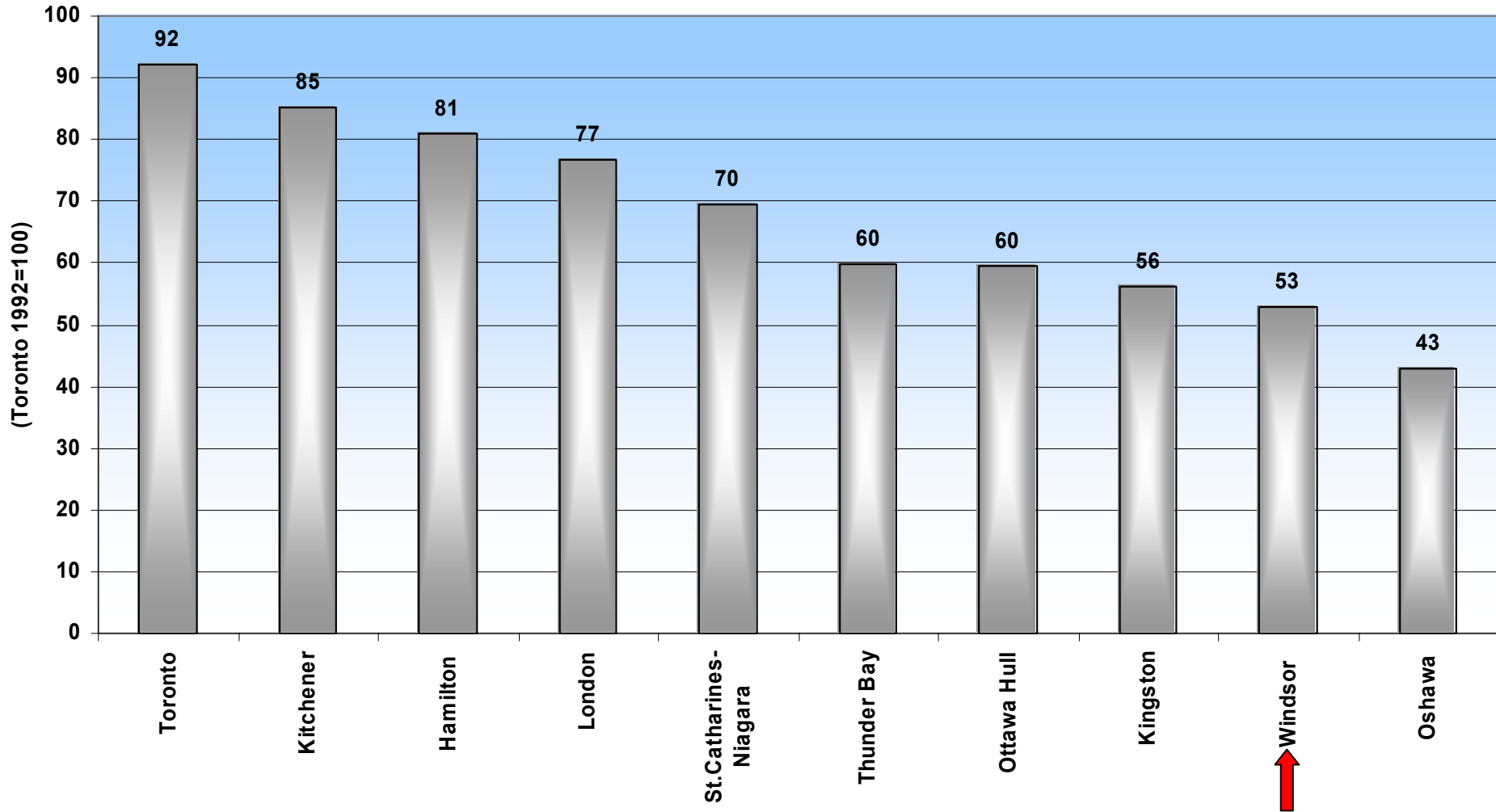


# Dwelling Type & Tenure for Ontario and Windsor CMA, 2001





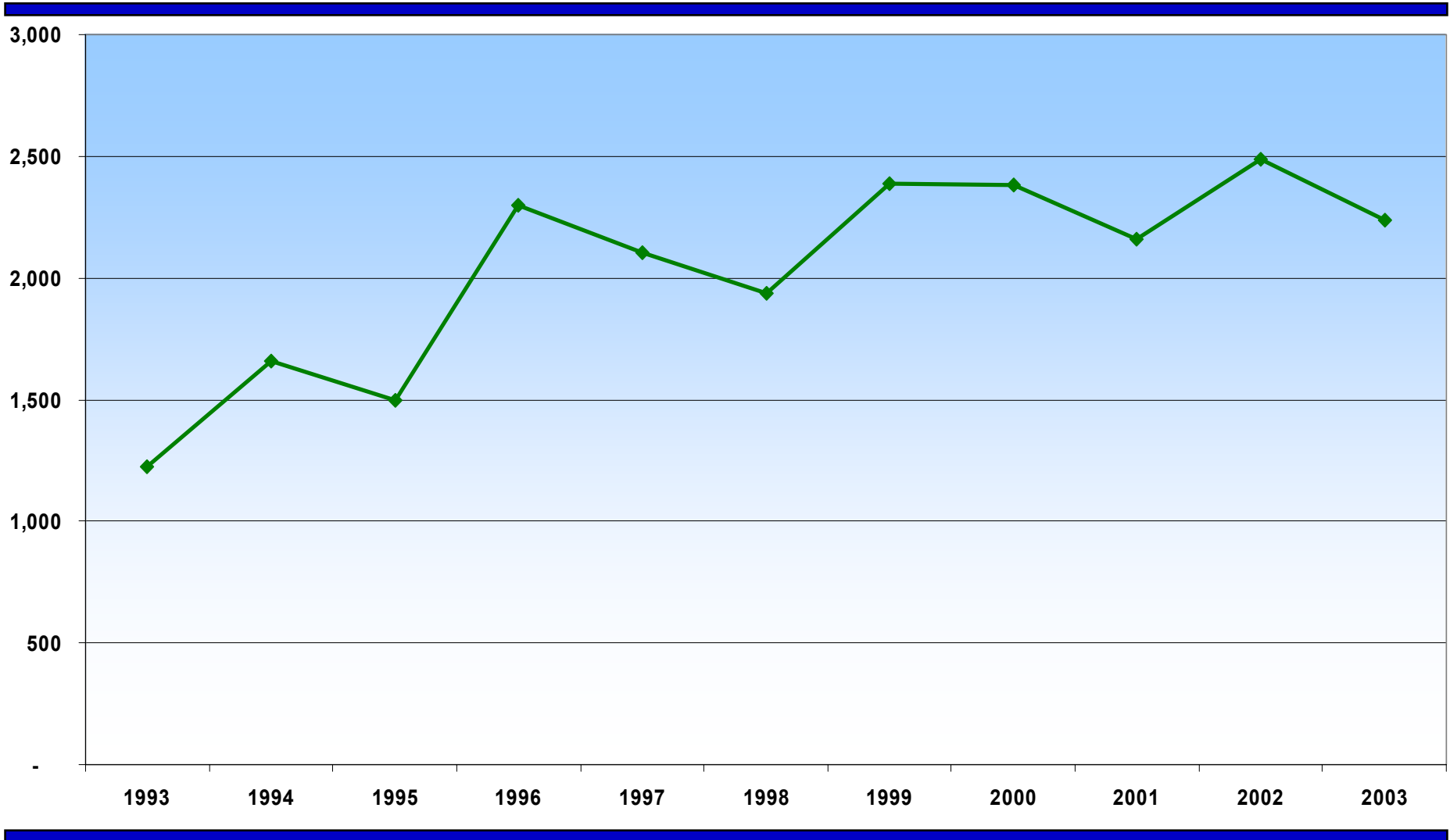
# Industrial Diversity for Ontario CMAs, 2002

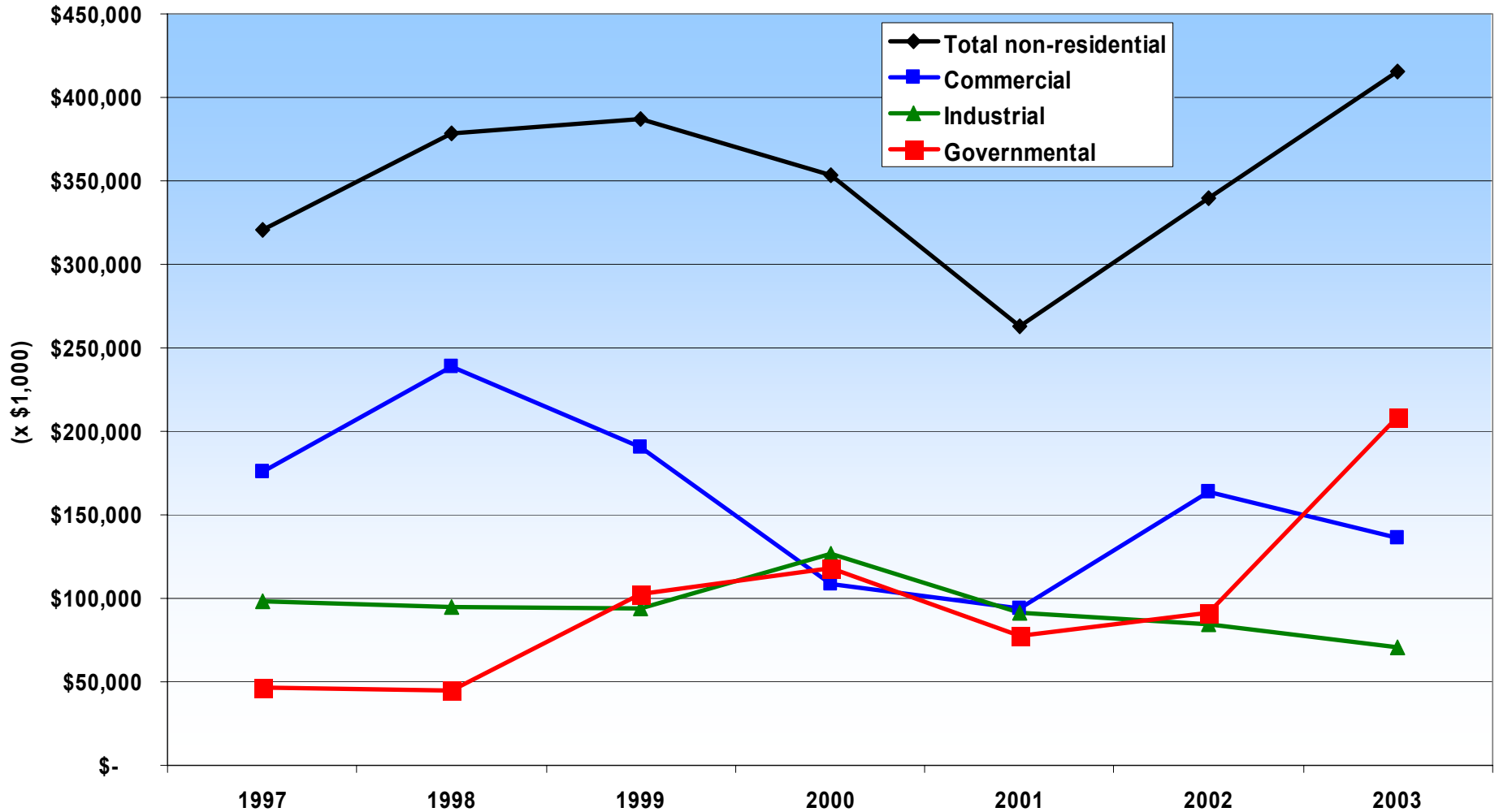


# Housing Starts for Windsor CMA, 1993 to 2003





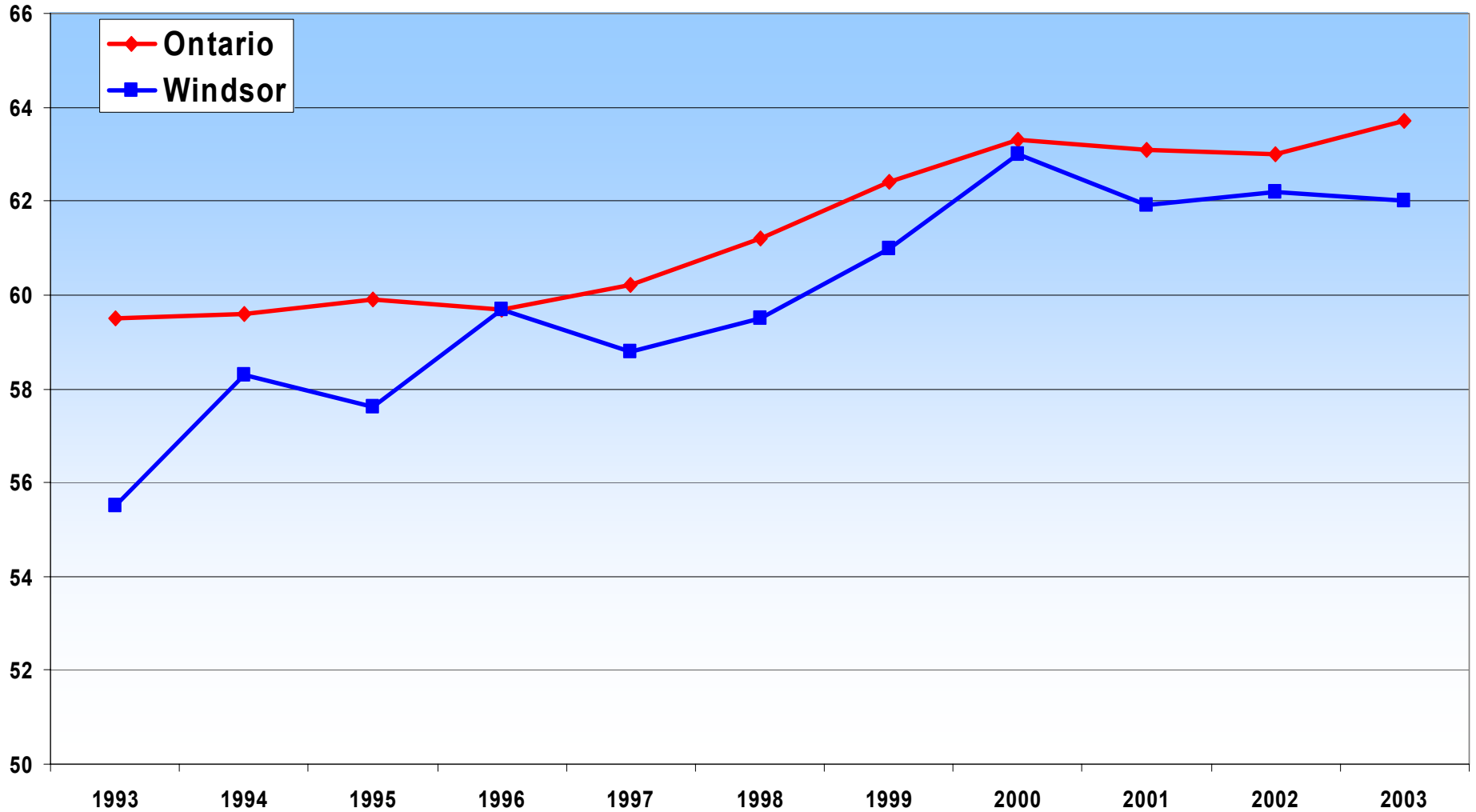
# Investment in Non-Residential Building Construction in the Windsor CMA, 1997 to 2003

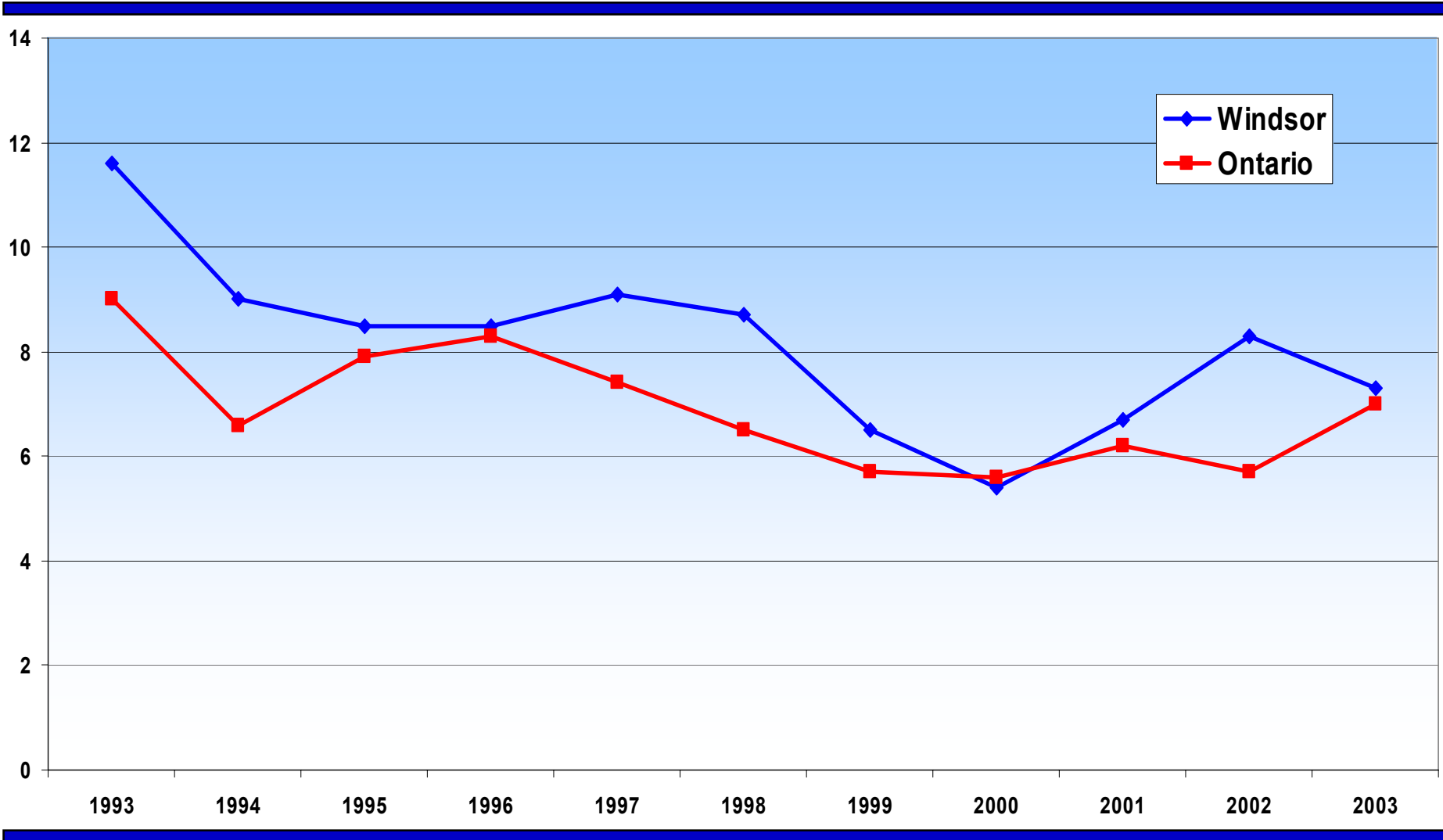


# Employment Rate for Ontario and Windsor CMA, 1993 to 2003

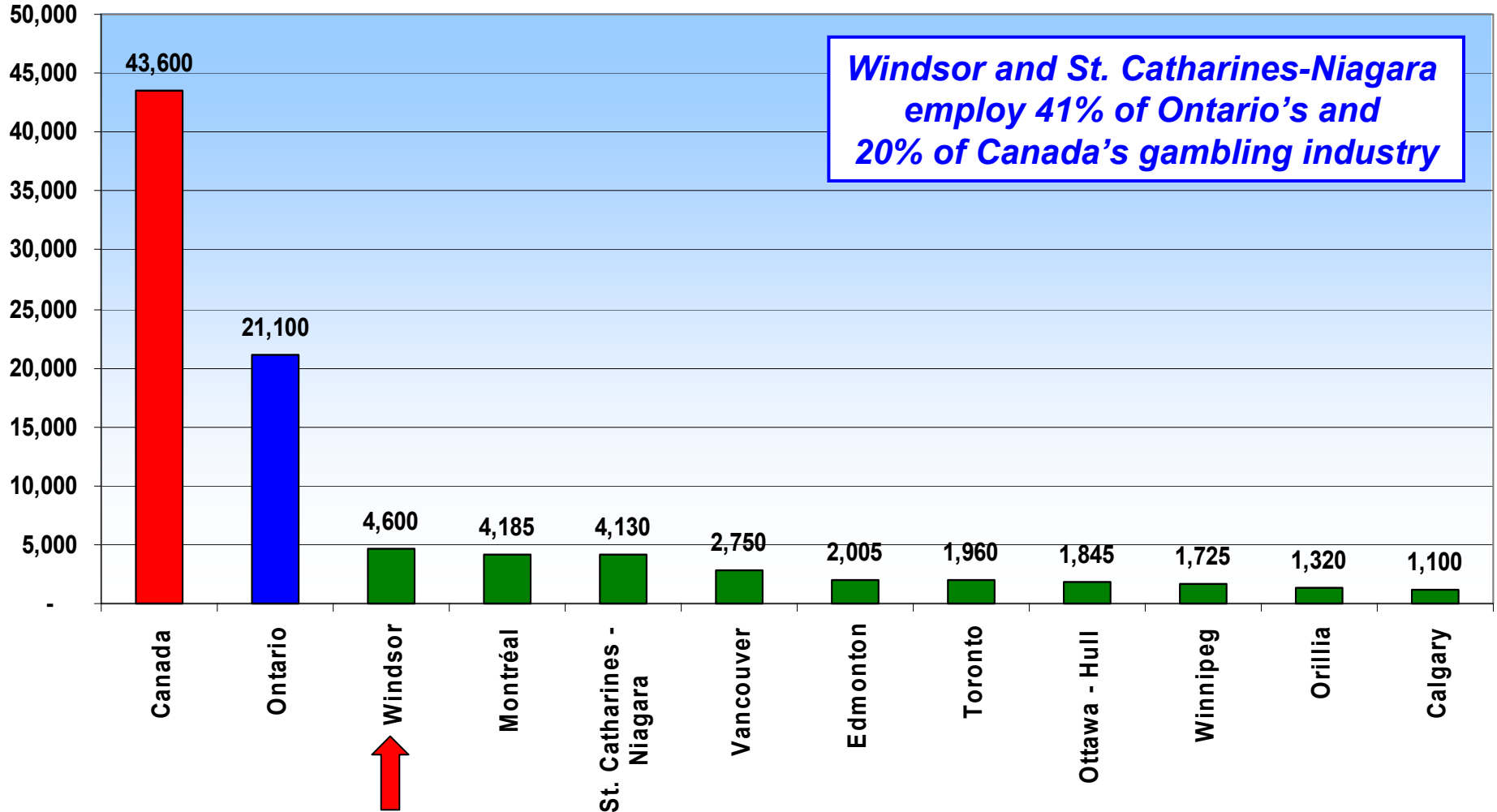

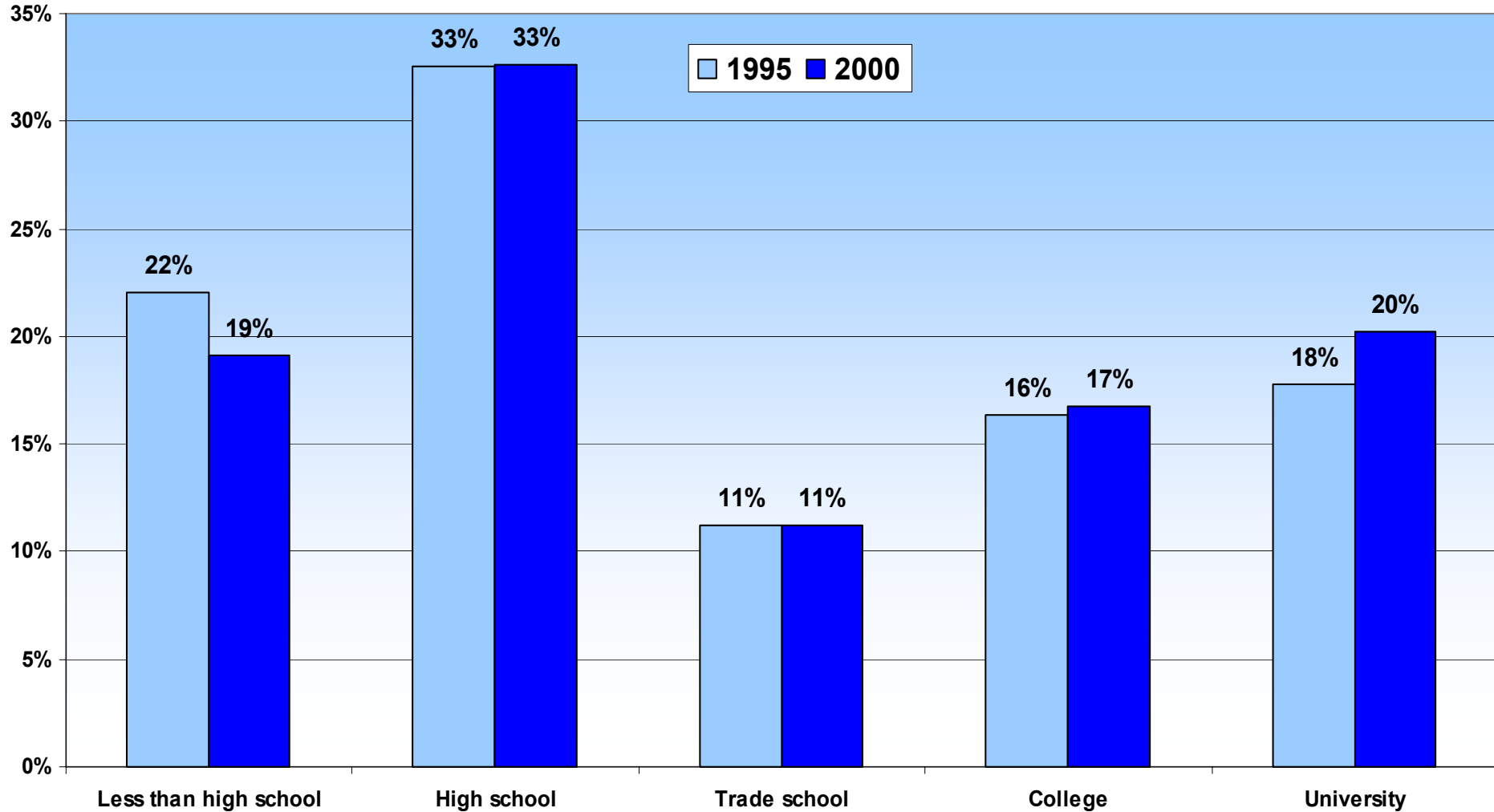
# Top Ten Cities That Employ Persons in the Gambling Industry, 2001

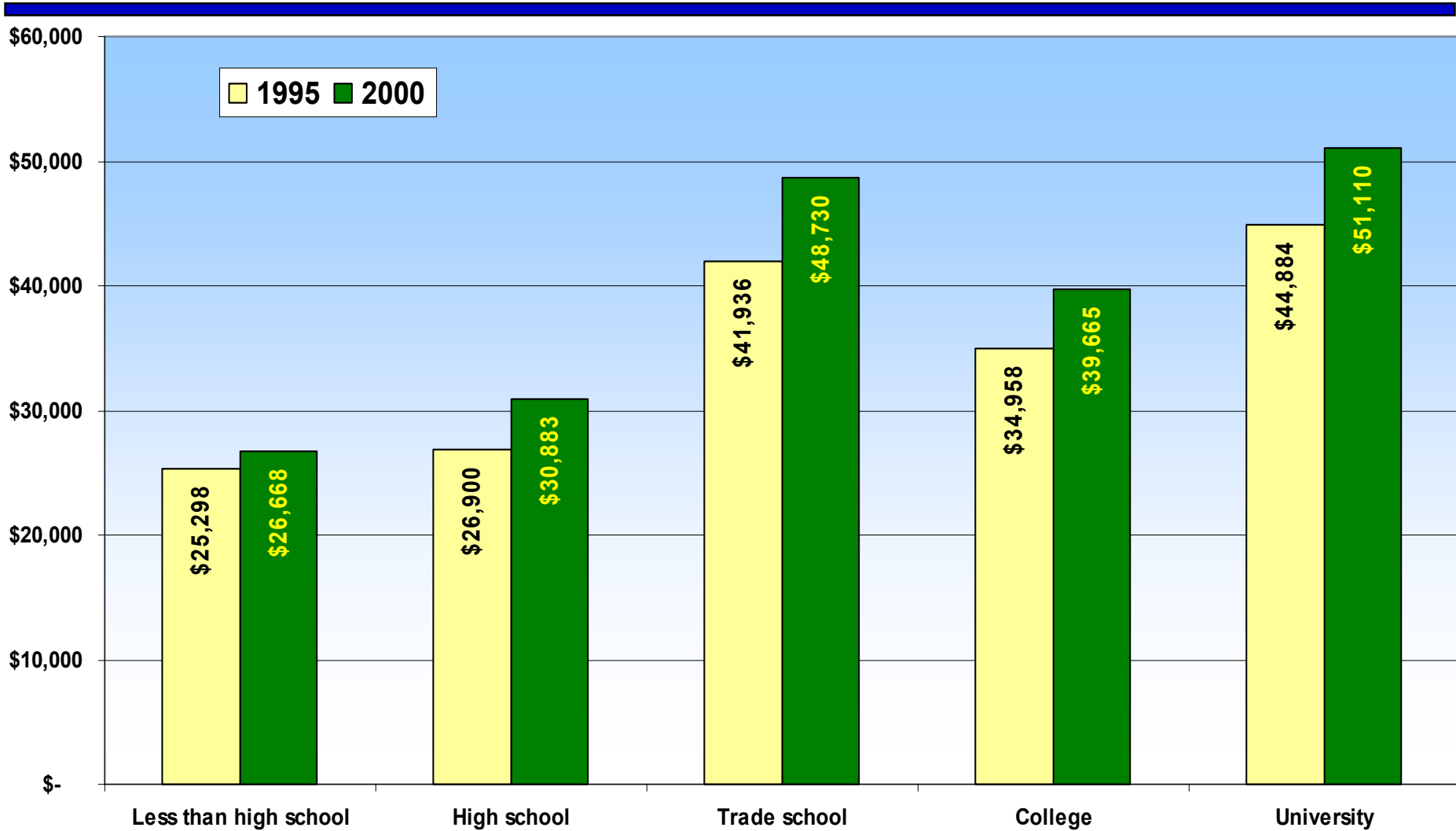


# Level of Education for Windsor CMA, 15 Years and Over, 1995 and 2000



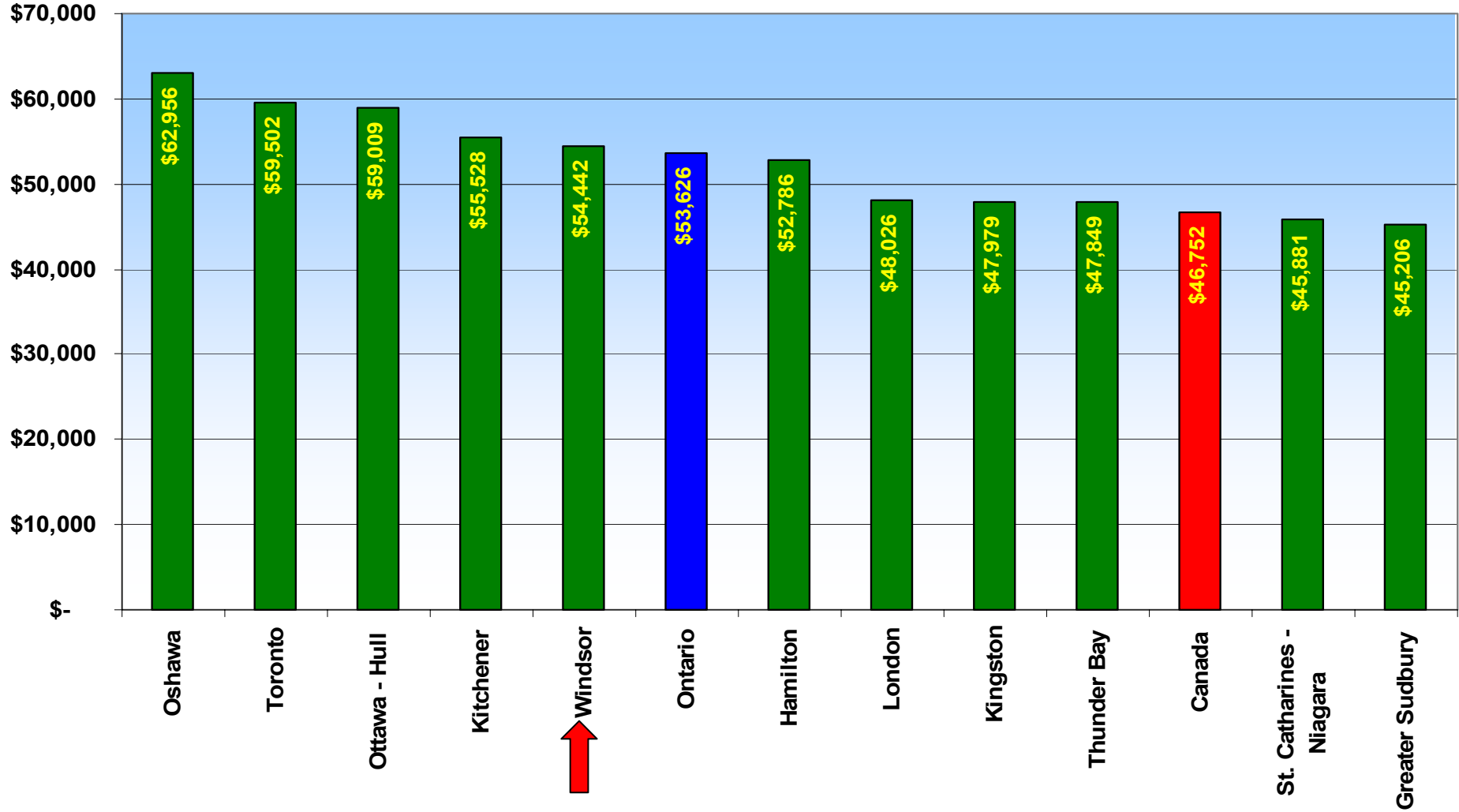


# Average Employment Income by Level of Education, 1995 to 2000, Windsor CMA



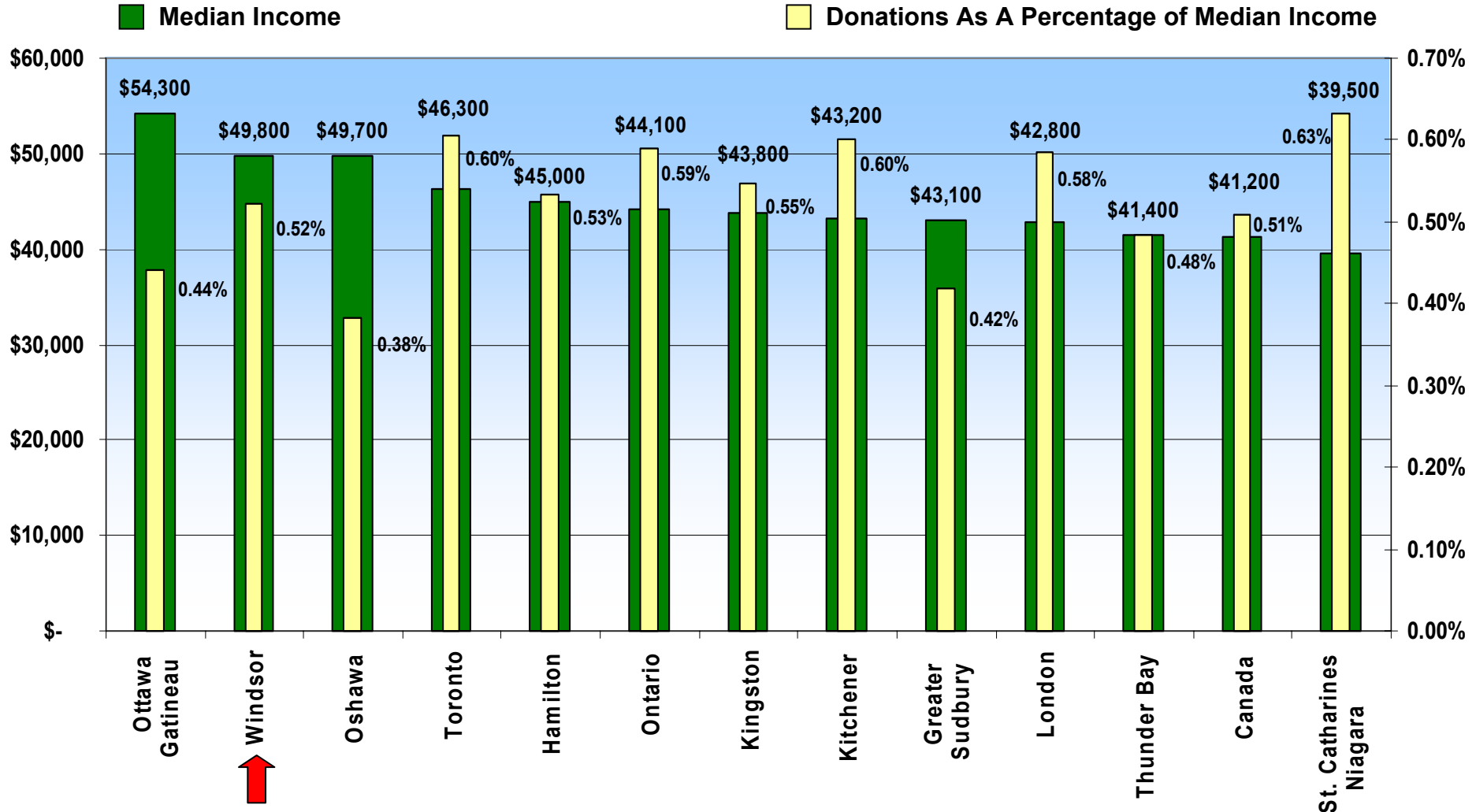


# Median Household Income for Ontario Census Metropolitan Areas, 2001



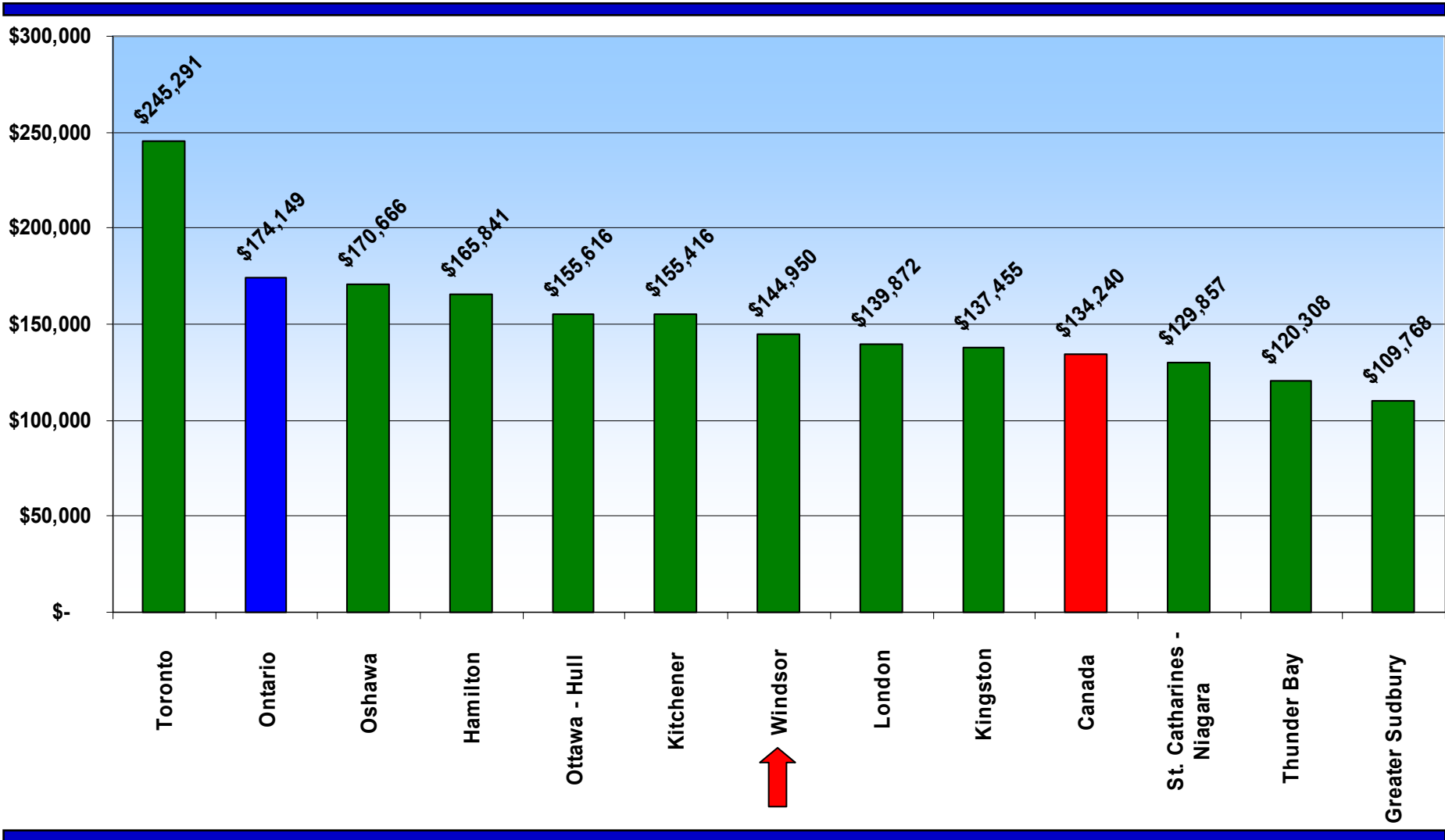


# Median Income and Donations As A Percentage of Median Income, Ontario CMAs, 2002

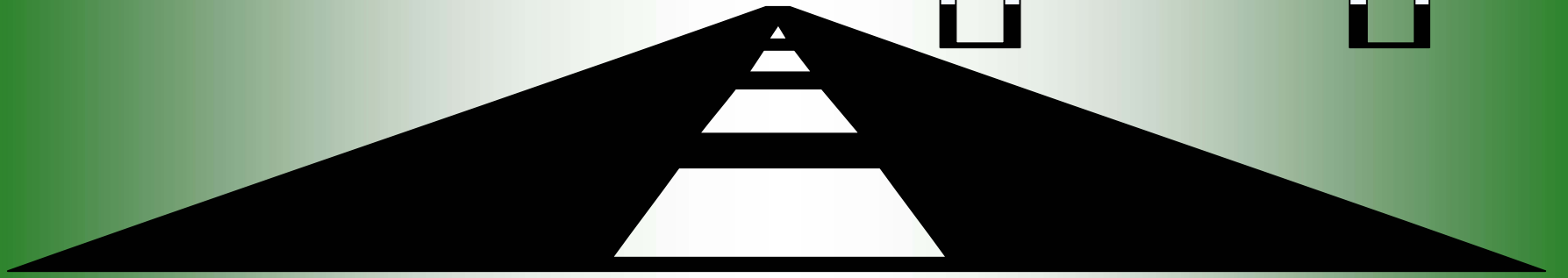
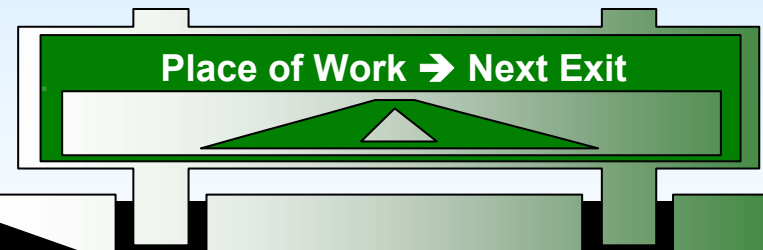




# Average Value of Dwelling for Ontario CMAs, 2001

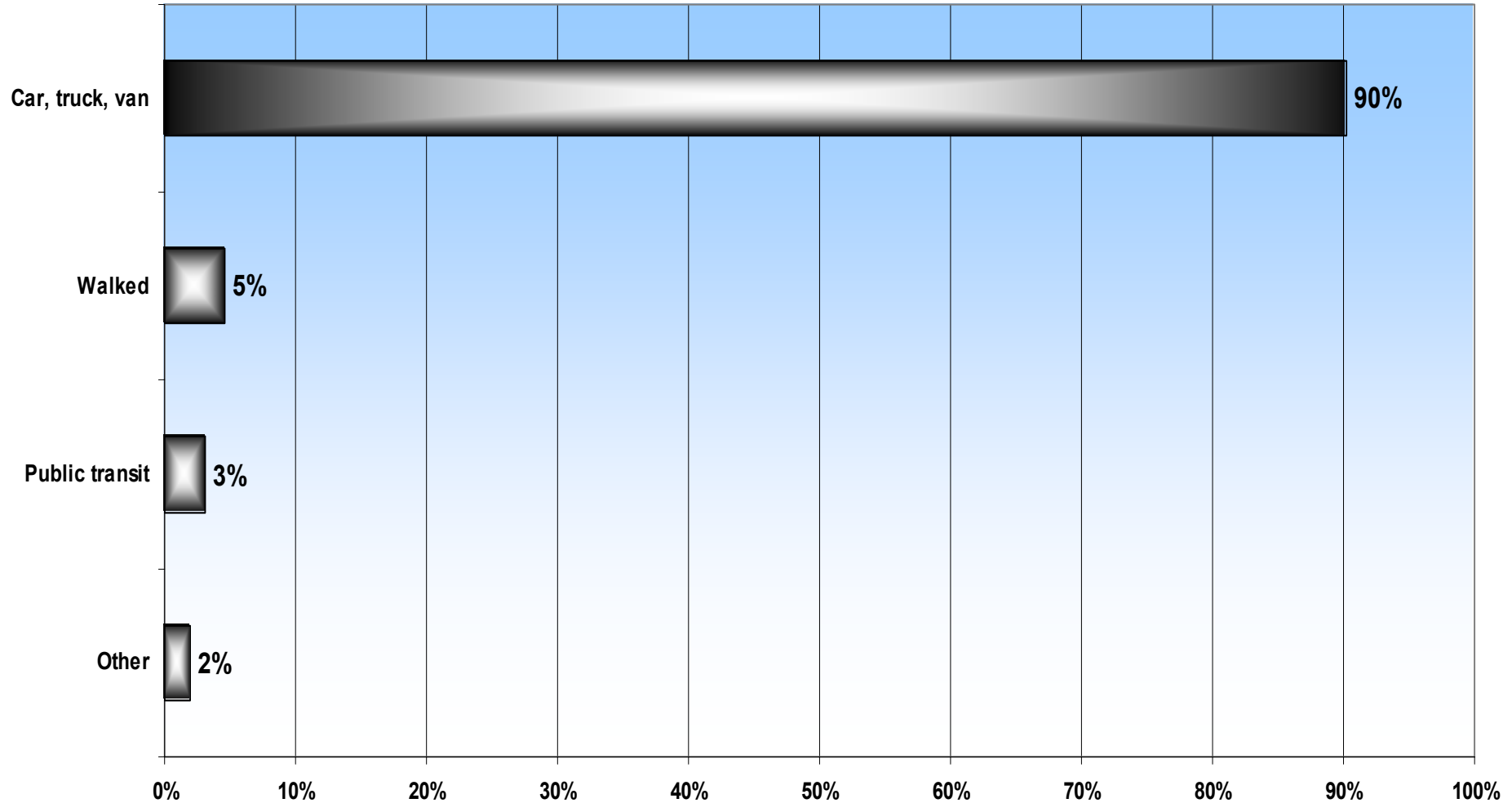

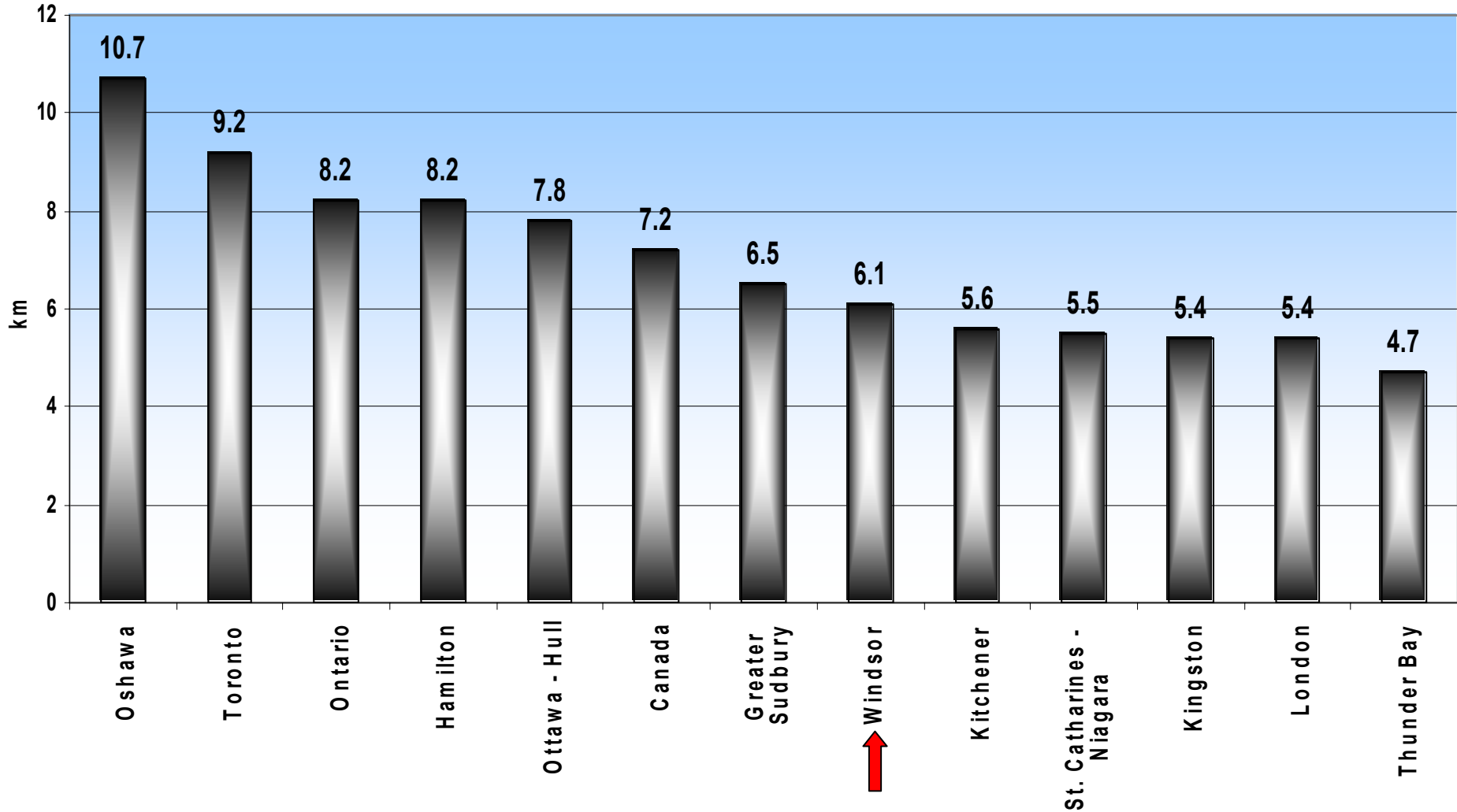
# Mode of Transportation to Place of Work for Windsor CMA, 2001

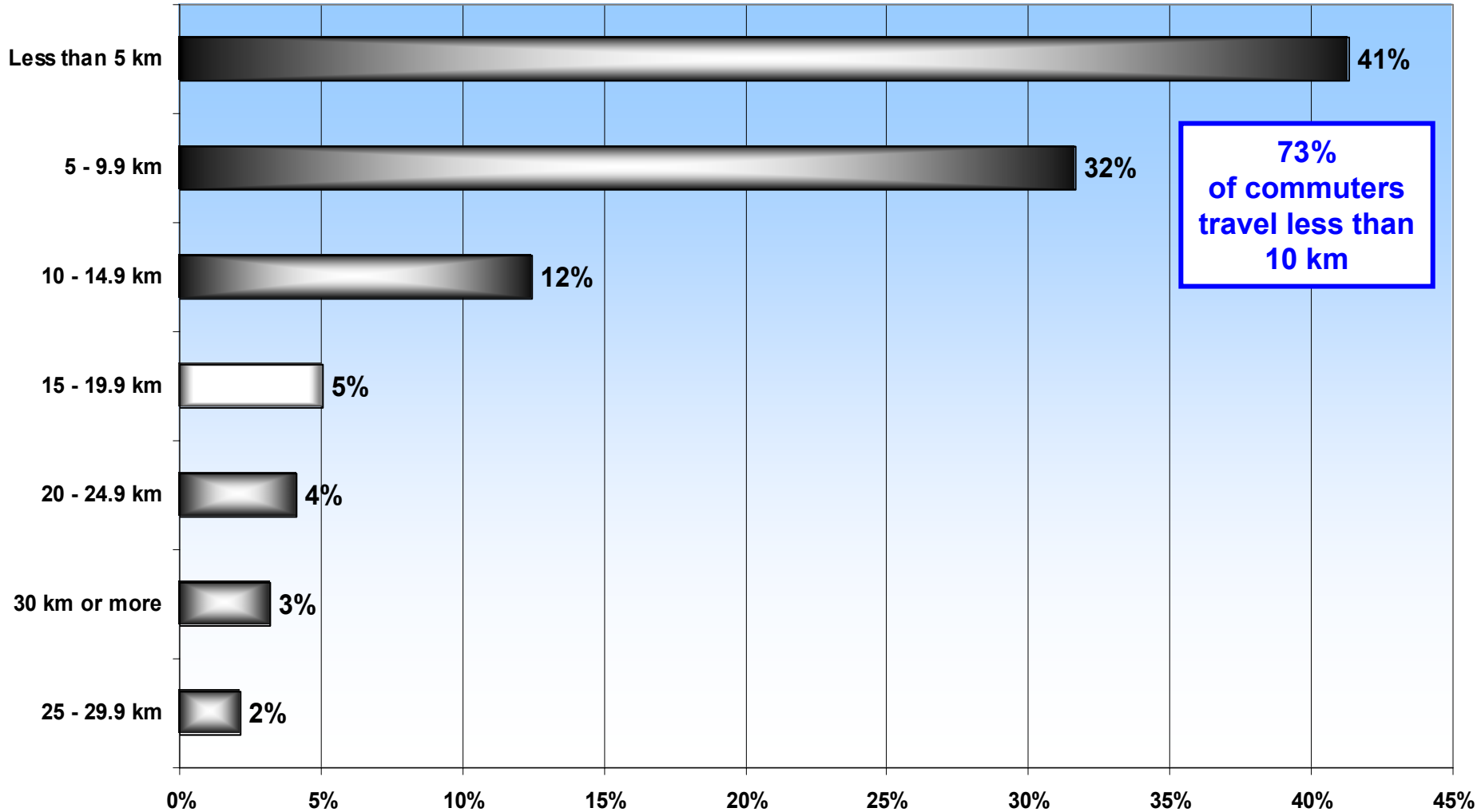


# Median Commuting Distance to Work for Ontario CMAs, 2001



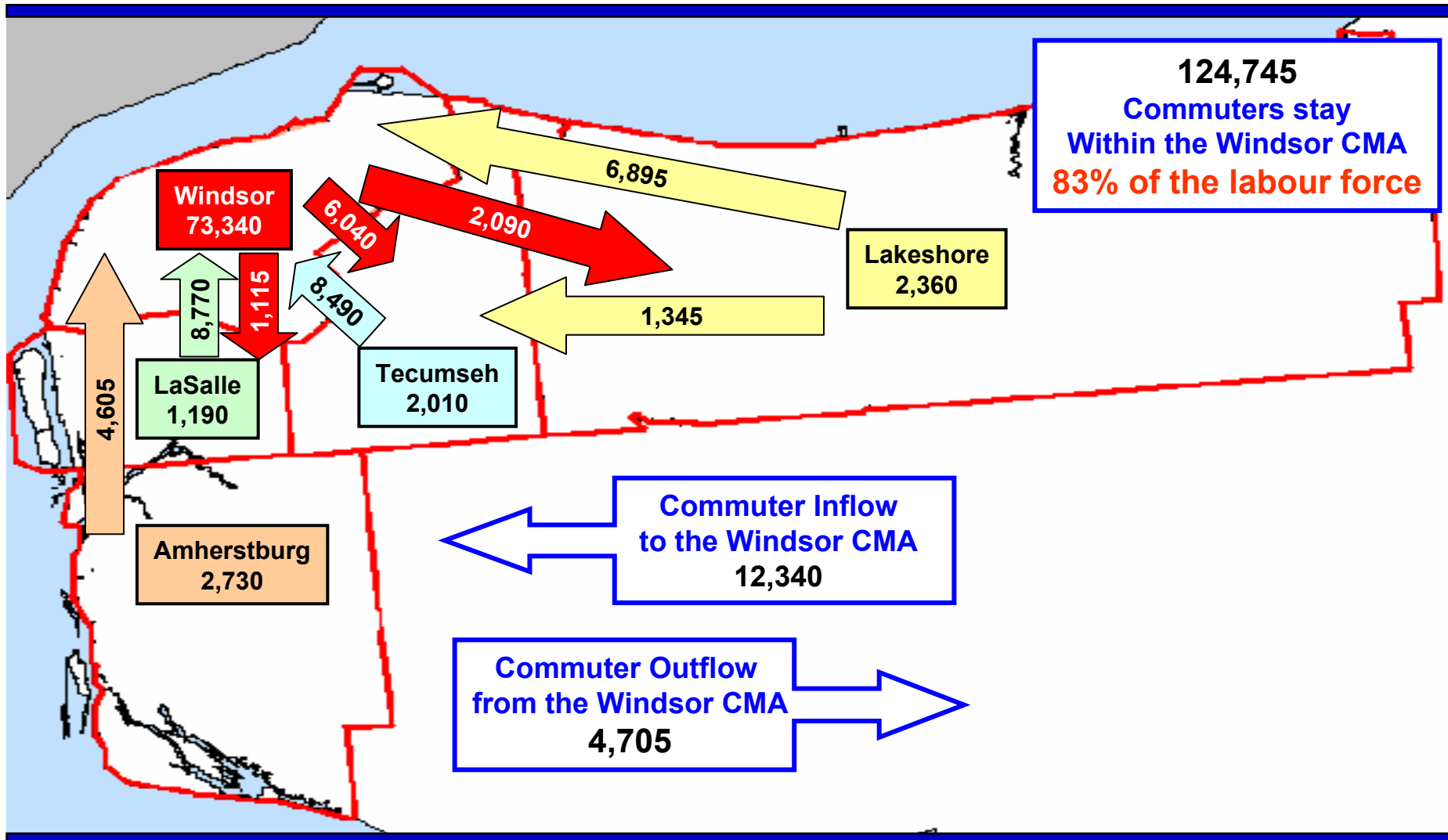


# Distance to Place of Work by Percent of Total Commuters for Windsor CMA, 2001

# CENSUS 2006

## **Objectives of the 2006 Census are:**

- To improve the confidentiality and security of census data;
- To make it easier for respondents to provide their information through electronic means
- To improve the timeliness of the census data releases.

## **Changes planned to meet those objectives:**

To accomplish these objectives Statistics Canada is planning to move from highly decentralized and manually intensive collection and capture operations to a more centralized and automated approach.

- More direct mail – less census representatives
- One central data capture centre (DCC)
- The Internet as a response option
- Imaging and automated character recognition from the paper questionnaires
- Computer assisted telephone interviewing (CATI) and automated systems to facilitate the follow-up with respondents who do not complete a questionnaire.
